

ROUTE 66 DINER, TULSA, OKLAHOMA

The Route 66 Diner, 2639 e. 11th Street, (Route 66), in Tulsa, offers a variety of great American dishes, such as meatloaf, chicken fried steak, and various delicious They are famous soups. from Chicago to L. A. for their generous portions and homemade bread, made fresh daily.

The Route 66 Diner was founded in February, 1988 by two sisters-in-law Debbie and Sherry Higgs. Since the fall of 1989 Debbie has assumed sole ownership.

The diner was originally a Silver Castle hamburger restaurant. Silver Castle was a Tulsa-based chain of restaurants built in the late Thirties. It is the only Silver Castle building known to be left standing in Tulsa.

The interior of the diner has an authentic feel to it. First of all, the ceiling is curved, and the ceiling and wall panels are porcelainized to give it a nice, clean feeling. There is

a nice countertop and four tables. It seats approximately 25 people. A very nice and very old cash register that dates from the late Twenties and an old Coca-Cola fountain drink dispenser also enhance the atmosphere.

The diner also served as the birthplace of the Tulsa Chapter of the Oklahoma Route 66 Association. It held our first organizational meetings in June, 1989, headed by then president Shirley Hoppes.

Michael Wallis, the author of "Route 66, The Mother Road", recently taped a promotional video for his book there as well. You can see and read about the diner in his new book, due out in late April, 1990.





### 'ROADHOUSE 66'

REVIEW BY MIKE HIGGS

If you're into Route 66, then this is a must-see movie. It was filmed in 1984 in and around Kingman, Arizona. It stars William Dafoe and Judge Rienhold in their first starring roles. It's about a drifter named Johnny Hart (William Dafoe) and an entrepreneur named Beckman Hallsgood Jr. (Judge Rienhold). They meet by chance on Highway 66 in Arizona after Beckman got his radiator shot out by some local thugs led by Hoot (Alan Anta). They hall be into the state of Brusseled by Hoot (Alan Anta). Autry). They hobble into the town of Bowman where they find that the only car parts store is closed for the evening. The owner is down at the Sixty Six, a roadhouse not far away. The owner of the parts store is a woman named Jesse. She convinces the guys to spend the night and work on the car in the morning, which they do. The next day they are hassled by Hoot, again, and challenged to run in the Route 66 Classic. It's a road race from Bowman to Oatman on Old Route 66. They accept. Then there is plenty of action with Johnny racing against Hoot. I won't tell you the end, but good always wins. So, if you like hot rods, good times, and some of the best roadhouse music ever recorded, you're sure to like this movie.

There is brief nudity and adult language. I give it a 66 (our highest rating). Available on VHS.

### Eleventh May Be Tribute For Will Rogers

Chamber of Commerce Will Consider Suggestion, Leaders Say

CHANGE THE NAME of Eleventh Street to Will Rogers Avenue?

Some favor the suggestion, others oppose it, but the majority apparently favor Tulsa honoring the name of Oklahoma's famous sage by naming one of its major thoroughfares after him.

The Board of The Chamber of Commerce will probably be requested to assume the lead in requesting the City Commmission to designate Eleventh as Will Rogers Avenue, now that formidable opposition has developed to changing the name of Tulsa's Main Street.

John Rogers, president of the Chamber of Commerce, heartily favors the Eleventh Street plan, because "It would indelibly link the

Rogers name with that of
Tulsa." The name is logical, he contends, because U.S. 66 is the Will
Rogers Highway and Eleventh Street
takes it through the city.

I Burn Gibbons, another director

J. Burr Gibbons, another director, does not think so much of the idea because, he says, Rogers' name here could be perpetuated in more substantial fashion. He will not oppose the plan, however, unless something else of a more concrete nature is suggested.

Other board members were noncommittal, prefering to wait until a proposition is formally presented before passing an opinion.
