ROUTE ENTHUSIASTS OF WESTERN OKLAHOMA HOLD MEETING

A group of Western Oklahoma Route 66 enthusiasts met Monday night, January 29, in Hydro.

The purpose of the meeting was to encourage each town to become members of the recently organized OKLAHOMA ROUTE 66 ASSOCIATION.

Lucille Hamons, Hydro committee chairman and Caddo county representative on the Board of Trustees for the OKLAHOMA ROUTE 66 ASSOCIATION, introduced Danny Scott, membership chairman for the state organization. He spoke to the group and emphasized the importance of organizing local chapters and possibly a western Oklahoma regional organization.

Representatives from each of the eight towns present were advised to help create interest in their own communities and become involved in promoting and preserving OKLAHOMA HISTORIC ROUTE 66.

In addition to Oklahomans, the state organization has several members from other states as well as members from Australia. By banding together, the Route 66 project is expected to be the next chance for towns to come alive.

"Too many smaller towns are just sitting there, wasting their potential," said Scott. "I care about small towns," he continued.

Scott is a resident of Oklahoma City. He has his own wholesale business and specializes in memorabilia or Route 66.

The promotion of Route 66 is not a competition between towns, but rather, a way to promote what is termed as the largest tourist attraction in Oklahoma. Each town has something unique to visitors from another area.

Scott introduced John "Shorty" Barnett, an Oklahoma City businessman who is a Democratic candidate for Governor of Oklahoma. In a brief statement, Barnett expressed his interest in the development of tourism along Route 66. He referred to the road as "a latter day Santa Fe Trail" that will bring people back to Oklahoma. He stressed that Oklahoma's #1 commodity is its people and western attractions Oklahoma has anywhere else along the route from Chicago to Los Angeles. Everyday life is interesting to visitors from other areas..

REDISCOVERING AMERICA The Phantoms and Dreams of Route 66

Michael Wallis A Lecture/Slide Program

One of the most famous highways in the world. Route 66 reaches across more than 2,400 miles, three time zones and eight states -- Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California -- from Chicago to Los Angeles. It has been cilled the Mother Road, the Road of Flight, the Glory Road and, because it goes through the center of so many towns, the Main Street of America.



The United States has become ho-

mogenized by super highways, shopping malls and franchise restaurants. Wallis takes you on a trip down Route of to rediscover America before it became generic -- when motels didn't take reservations, when there were genuine barber shops and drug stores, when doctors made house calls. Movie theaters weren't look-alike boxes in a shopping center. There were no diet soft drinks nor imported waters. People drank straight from the tap and sipped iced tea brewed by the sun, or guzzled bottles of cold beer or Coca Cola or Grape Nehi. The highway has been a mirror held up to the nation. Route oo put Americans in touch with other Americans through its necklace of neon lights; billboard signs; motor courts; garages, and diners and cafes with big-boned waitresses who served up burgers, plate lunches and homemade pie. America seemed more innocent. Hitchhiking was safe and nobody knew about cholesterol.

Route 66 is Steinbeck and Will Rogers and Woody Guthrie and Merle Haggard and Dorthea Lange and Mickey Mantle and Jack Kerouac. It's yesterday, today and tomorrow. It's a road of phantoms and dreams. Wallis's program, illustrated with slides, will bring you to experience the romance of traveling the open highway while rediscovering America on Route 60

Michael Wallis is author of the books. *Route 66. The Mother R and*, to be published by St. Martin's Press in the spring of 1990, and *Oil Main: The Story of Frank Phillips and the Birth of Phillips Petroleum* (Doubleday). A free lance writer, his work has appeared in *The New York Times, Smithsonian* and *Time*, among others.

Route 66 Study Act of 1989

On October 18, 1989, U.S. Representative Wes Watkins introduced legislation directing the National Park Service to prepare a study and report about U.S. Route 66. Included within the study would be an evaluation of the significance of the Route, options for preservation and use of the remaining segments and options for preservation of features associated with the highway. The House Bill is the companion bill to S.963, introduced by Senator Domenici from New Mexico.

In a recent meeting with Representative Watkins, he promised to make every effort to get the House Bill passed by June of this year.



Adopt A Highway

Oklahoma's roadways are the first welcome given to the traveling public and they may be the only image a traveller gets of our state. Roadside trash and debris can create a lasting negative perception which takes much time and money to dispel.

The answer: 1st - Don't Lay That Trash on Oklahoma! and

2nd - Encourage your club, chapter, church or other group to adopt-a-highway.

As you travel around the state, you've probably noticed signs identifying civic group adoptions of roadways. The adopta-highway program, initiated in 1989 by the Oklahoma Department of Transportation has visibly impacted Oklahoma's landscape in a positive fashion.

Highways, such as Oklahoma Route 66, are adoptable in two (2) mile segments. An adopting club agrees to periodically cleanup the adopted right-of-way for a 2-year period. The Department of Transportation supplies instructional material which includes a video on safety and provides trash sacks, safety vests and hats. In exchange for the commitment to cleanup, signs are installed on the right-of-way which recognize the organization's efforts.

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IRS Recognition

On February 21, 1990, the Oklahoma Route 66 Association received notice of its acceptance as a 501-C-3 corporation. The advance ruling period extends from October 16, 1989, through 1994 after which permanent ruling status can be achieved.

The confirmation of 501-C-3 status opens the door for expanded Associate efforts at fund raising for major preservation and restoration efforts along the route.





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OKLAHOMA ROUTE 66 CRUISE


In a few months, the first Route 66 Cruise and Poker Run will send an estimated 5,000 leisurely drivers past El Reno, Yukon and another 17 towns from El Reno to Claremore along the historic highway.

The Cruise/Poker Run was developed as a way to spark interest in the newly formed organization. Motorists will start from one of two starting points — El Reno or Claremore — and travel to the other city. The contest is not a race, however.

Contestants will have from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. to travel the route. They will be required to stop at each of the 19 towns or cites along the way. Some towns will be checkpoints that motorists must be verified at, others will hand out playing cards. Out of five or seven cards (yet to be determined), those with the best poker hands at the end of the day will receive prizes.

Entries sought for Mr. and Mrs. Route 66 contest

In conjunction with the statewide Route 66 celebration this June, Lincoln County will crown its first "Mr. and Mrs. Route 66."

The contest is open to county residents who are at least 66 years of age and able to travel. Entrants must submit an essay titled "These were my kicks on Route 66," which will determine the winners.

The essay must be 266 words or less, typed and must include when and where their experience took place, anywhere on Route 66.

The contest is the first of its kind in Lincoln County, as well as the state. It helps recognize the preservation of Route 66 and its historical significance, said Linda Byrd, contest committee chairman and Chandler-area Southwestern Bell manager.

Only individual applications will be accepted and a \$1 entry fee is required. Finalists will be notified by mail. The judges will make the final decisions at the Lincoln County Route 66 pageant in

Chandler on June 6.

The winners will receive a plaque and other Route 66 memorabilia. They will also travel to other Lincoln County towns that are celebrating "Route 66 Preservation Days."

Finalists will receive t-shirts, lapel pins and other Route 66 memorabilia donated by participating sponsors.

Contestants can enter by filling out the entry forms printed in the first Davenport New Era issue each month beginning today and ending May 3. The deadline for entries is May 6.

"This is an excellent opportunity for people to share their experiences with fellow Oklahomans," Byrd said.

Lincoln County winners will be entered in a state-wide contest that will take place on June 10.
