

## SECOND ANNUAL ROUTE 66 CELEBRATION SET FOR JUNE 8-9

Oklahoma communities from Texola to Quapaw will observe the second annual Route 66 celebration June 8-9 along the famous road that served as the mainstreet of America before there was an interstate system. Oklahoma has more miles of the famous roadway than any other state. The highlight of the celebration is a "cruise" that involves prizes and provides an opportunity for "cruisers" to cover all or part of Oklahoma's 396 miles of Partithe historic route. cipants are urged to "Take A Sentimental Journey", the theme for this year's cruise and participate in festivities planned in 46 different communities in 13 Oklahoma counties.

The Oklahoma Route 66 association and the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department are promoting the event which will bring thousands of visitors from surrounding states into Oklahoma communities for the nostalgic events. Last year hundreds of visitors participated in the cruise and many drove vintage autos and wore fashions reminiscent of the period when Route 66 played a major role in travel between Chicago and Los Angeles. Kent Martindale, President, said that this celebration is expected to grow each year as more tourists hear about the event.

Oklahoma is one of eight states hosting annual events in honor of the former U.S. highway that has been downgraded to state highway in most areas. Anyone interested in participating in the cruise should contact the Oklahoma Route 66 Association office at 6434 NW 39th Expressway, Suite D, Bethany, OK., 73008 before May 25. The Association telephone number is 405-495-RT66. Entry fees are \$20 for Route 66 Association members and \$30 for non-members. Early registrants will receive a \$5 discount. Registration is from 5 to 10 p.m. on June 7 and from 7 a.m. to noon June 8 at the Holiday Inn Northwest, Oklahoma City; the Southwest Airport Hotel, Tulsa; the City Park in Elk

City; Tilghman Park in Chandler or the Miami Civic Center.

Cruise participants will receive a passport and a map/booklet lisitng activities, celebrations, attractions and checkpoints in participating communities.

To be eligible, "cruisers" must travel Route 66 to any seven participating communities and have their passports validated at predesignated checkpoints. Passports must be turned in at Miami, Chandler or Elk City. Prizes will be awarded in closing ceremonies on June 9 in Miami, Chandler and Elk City.

Proceeds from the event support restoration projects of unique historic landmarks along the route.





### ELK CITY ATTRACTIONS

Elk City has two exciting new tourist attractions awaiting this summer's visitors.



The Anadarko Basin Museum of Natural History has just added Parker Rig #114 to its collection. This 179 foot monster towering over the heart of downtown Elk City is the world's tallest oil rig not currently in operation. The rig and two identical sister rias

were built in the mid-60's for the Atomic Energy Commission. They were used to drill deep shafts in Alaska for testing of atomic bombs. Later, they were modified for conventional oil and gas exploration. The museum is located in the former Casa Grande Hotel at the corner of Main and Third (Route 66) and is open seven days a week.

Oklahoma's newest major attraction is Bear Creek Wildlife. It offers a 3 mile drive-thru safari filled with 17 species of exotic animals. It also has a petting zoo, a gift shop featuring crafts promoting Oklahoma Heritage, a snack bar, and Belle Star's Hideout. The Hideout features steaks, elk, venison, buffalo, alligator, seafood and quail.

The Park is open from 10 a.m. all year. From Route 66, go three miles south on Merritt Road and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles west.

We look forward to working with them again.



# ROUTE 66 TOURING RALLY

The south steps of the State Capital will be the starting point for the Route 66 Touring Rally on Sunday, May 19th. Co-sponsored by the Association and the Oklahoma Region Sports Car Club of America (SCCA), the rally will wind its way off and on Route 66 for about a hundred miles and finish at Eldon Lyon Park in Bethany with a "BYOP" - bring your own picnic!

According to rallymaster Steve England, the rally is similiar to a Poker Run since contestants follow written route instructions. The object is to maintain preset average speeds and arrive at checkpoints on time. Checkpoint locations are not known to participants until the start of the race and points are taken off for being early or late.

Registration opens at noon and cars will leave one minute apart starting at 1:01. Entry fees are \$10 for members and \$15 for nonmembers. Any vehicle is allowed as long as it meets safety standards and has insurance. Trophies will be awarded in three classes: novice, experienced and "equipped". Equipped refers to computers, timing devices and odometers. Special awards will be given to the following: American car, British car, German car, Asian car, oldest car, club award, club team and a family award will be given to the highest placing car with two or more generations on board.

Rallying is a non-speed, family sport with the emphasis on fun and fellowship. Route 66 lends a scenic, historic touch and this event should be memorable. Entry blanks are available at the Association and walk-ins are welcome. For more information contact:

## C A L I F O R N I A N EXPLORES ROUTE 66

A former Southern Californian, who claims he was born to wander, is creating an on the road career for himself. J. Thomas McClelland, 58, was born in St Louis but grew up in southern California. Now residing in Sacramento, he won't be there long.

Tired of the workaday world, he started a publication that will take him to the backroads and small towns of America.

The third edition of his quarterly tabloid came off the press in February. The SLOW LANE JOURNAL is 28 pages of McClelland's reportage of travels.


His wanderlust continues. Claiming he has the attention span of a 12 year old he has shifted gears again. He has driven more than 11,500 miles this year on his new adventure. He spent three weeks in Germany where he added 2,740 of the total miles. His main story beat, however, is the U.S. His February SLOW LANE JOURNAL covers off-beat events and characters in five states: California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.


He followed nostalgic Highway 66 as much as he could from Clinton, Oklahoma to Flagstaff, Arizonia. He gives much coverage to the old highway, a road his parents took him on to visit relatives in the Missouri Ozarks after World War II. "I can see why so many people are enthused about the rebirth of the famous highway," McClelland said after his December trip. "It's a big part of America and there is a special feeling when one can trace the path of the old road."


On his December trip, McClelland overnighted in Amarillo, Texas, Grants, New Mexico and Flagstaff, Arizonia. These are all old Route 66 towns. He plans to give more coverage to Route 66 in future editions.

In his travels, he drops bundles of the papers to RV parks throughout the country, anything to help spread the word. His primary audience is "the older kids of America, those who love to wander - or even get lost." On upcoming trips, McClelland says he will drive a motor home, emblazoned with his publication's logo in the shape of a 2-lane road. Inside his traveling office. he will have his typesetting and layout equipment, 35mm cameras and a video camera.
