

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



Route 66 Offers Toll-Free Drive Between Tulsa, City

Stroud Chamber of Commerce Encourages Scenic Alternative to Turnpike

STROUD (AP)-Consider the alternative.

Oklahoma Turnpike Authority officials, tired of carping over toll increases due to go into effect Wednesday, are fond of reminding disgruntled customers that there's always an alternative.

No one makes Oklahoma drivers pay turnpike tolls.

The alternative for drivers trying to travel between the state's two largest cities is Route 66, John Steinbeck's "Mother Road," and Oklahoma's historic link to the world.

"We'd like to see more people take Route 66 and visit us," said Stroud Chamber of Commerce President Kent Clovis. "When I need to get to Tulsa fast, I take the turnpike, but when I want to have an enjoyable drive, I take 66."

On the cusp of a 10 to 25 percent increase in the cost of driving a car to Oklahoma City, more may be considering just that "enjoyable" alternative.

For those intrigued by the nontoll alternative, a drive down Oklahoma 66 reveals it to be about as fast as the turnpike, but lined with curio shops and other fascinations not available on the toll road and-as of Wednesday-\$2.75 cheaper.

The traditional knock against the "free" road is speed, or the lack thereof.

In fact, Oklahoma 66 is only a bit slower than the toll road.

Not being an interstate highway, the road has a top speed limit of 55 mph, which occasionally drops to 15 mph as the road goes through construction and business districts.

Nineteen stop lights and stop signs further slow progress, as can farm equipment and other drivers who choose not to take life in the fast lane.

Between Sapulpa and Edmond-86 mile-the road is only two lanes wide, making passing a sometimes challenging experience.

Still though, the road can easily be driven from junctions at both ends of the Turner Turnpike in just over two hours, about half an hour more than the fastest legally permissible trip down the toll road.

What the road my lack in miles per hour, it makes up for in shopping opportunities and ease of driving.

The turnpike is antiseptic: reduced to a straight-edge cutting across the state with nothing but two McDonald's and three gas stations to break up the 88 miles from terminal to terminal.

Interstate 44 in central Oklahoma is also the domain of semi tractortrailers, stirring up enough turbulence for passenger cars on a windy day to make even a steady driver uneasy.

One of the advantages of the road less taken is that fewer people, especially fewer truck drivers, are taking it.

Turnpike Authority records show that in May 1993 some 856,502 vehicles took the Turner Turnpike. Oklahoma Department of Transportation vehicle counter midway between Oklahoma City and Tulsa show the equivalent of 102,000 vehicles a month are using Oklahoma 66.

While drivers on Oklahoma 66 won't see a lot of semis, there are other things they will see that don't appear on the turnpike.

Woody Guthrie never wrote a song about the Turner Turnpike.

Martin Milner didn't star in a television series about Interstate 44.

Toll roads aren't tourist attractions.

"You wouldn't believe the people we get in here. Mostly Europeans," said Dawn Herr of Stroud's Rock Cafe, a 54-year-old roadside attraction that draws visitors to Lincoln County from around the world. "They want to see anything that's Route 66. Anything that '50s or '60s."

"Originally this was a big truck stop. All the truckers would say, 'I'll meet you at the Rock,'" Herr said. "Now we're getting Germans, Dutch, even Japanese. When they come in, they're full of questions about 66."

Route 66 also features live bait stores and lakes to use it in, more than a dozen antique stores and an exotic animal farm that breeds rheas, a South American bird that resembles and ostrich. In recent years, Transportation Department officials have tried to make the taxsupported alternative more attractive to drivers, department spokesman Larry Maloney said.

"(Oklahoma) 66 used to be a kind of winding, old two-lane road," Maloney said. "It's a real pleasure to drive now."

Drivers who haven't tried Oklahoma 66 since a major rehabilitation project took place during former Gov. George Nigh's terms in office might be surprised at the road's smooth surface and generally broad shoulders, he said.

The Transportation Department has \$2.1 million in construction under way and another \$16.6 million worth of work is planned.

\$565,006 grant for OHS helps fund Route 66 Museum in Clinton

A federal grant for \$565,006 will include \$438,111 for the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton, after recent approval for the OHS proposal by the Oklahoma Transportation Commission.

"The funding for the Route 66 Museum in Clinton will require \$87,622 in matching funds—producing a total of \$525,733 for that part of the project", said OHS executive director Blake Wade. "The matching funds will be provided by the OHS and the Friends of the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum. The rest of the grant will be used to develop a series of satellite exhibits, radio markers, historic markers, and educational programs from northeastern Oklahoma to the western border."

Together, they amount to the largest grant in the history of the OHS, exceeding the \$547,311 federal grant for the Oklahoma Newspaper Project last year, said Dr. Bob Blackburn, deputy director.

"The total Route 66 grant requires \$143,351 in matching funds for a total of \$708,357," Blackburn said. "The matching funds will be generated by \$88,000 from a recent \$350 million state bond issue and \$55,351 to be raised by the local communities involved in satellite exhibits and other local programs.

"Putting this project together required extensive cooperation from the Oklahoma Main Street Program of the Oklahoma Department of Commerce and the Oklahoma Department of Tourism and Recreation. We are fortunate to have such a good working relationship with these agencies, and Oklahomans will receive the ultimate benefit."

The grants were among 26 approved recently for a total of \$8.3 million by the Oklahoma Transportation Commission for funds under the federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act, better known as ISTEA.

"The Oklahoma Historical Society submitted a strong proposal because it could have a statewide impact," said Tim Gatz, enhancement program coordinator for the Oklahoma Department of Transportation. "It involves both education and tourism programs that can create growth opportunities for local communities." The OHS is expected to begin receiving funds later this year, possibly in late summer. At that point, the Society will hire a project director to begin developing a plan for the museum, satellite exhibits, markers, and education programs.

The Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton already has opened its first new exhibit after a transformation from the

former Western Trails Museum. The Friends of the Museum in Clinton, headed by Jake Lewis, has recruited more than 1,000 members at \$1 each in the local effort.

"This is a culmination of efforts for the whole state of Oklahoma to come together in a project that can relate to the national and international interest in Route 66," said Lewis. "We now have an Oklahoma central focal point to work with other states along the route.

"Clinton is a natural for the museum, because Jack Cutberth of Clinton promoted the highway for years as executive director of the U.S. Route 66 Association."

The satellite exhibits are expected to extend from Miami in far northeastern Oklahoma to Erick near the Texas Panhandle border.

"Each satellite exhibit would be planned with local stories, photos, and artifacts that fit the overall Route 66 theme," said Kathy Dickson, director of museums for the OHS. "Each also will require local matching funds. They will be color coded and designed to lead travelers from one to the other.

"In addition, we will have radio markers along old Route 66, so travelers can tune in and hear about historic events. Each radio marker includes a 10-watt transmitter for messages that can be heard for up to six miles. The overall effect of the satellites, radio markers, and historic markers will be what amounts to a 397-mile museum."

Dear friend of Route 66:

The members of the National Park Service Route 66 study team would like to invite all those interested in the road to a series of public meetings to discuss potential alternatives for its future management. A list of locations and times for these meeting as well as the names and phone numbers of local individuals who would be able to furnish additional information is included.

Participation at these meetings is encouraged and greatly appreciated. After National Park Service planners present preliminary concepts, participants will have a chance to discuss, clarify and further develop these ideas. This public input will be considered in developing alternatives which will become the basis for the study to be submitted to Congress for consideration.

The following is a very brief summary of the preliminary concepts which will form the basis for discussion at these public meetings. A newsletter with additional information will be sent shortly.

1. ROUTE 66 REDISCOVERED AND NURTURED

This concept provides a traditional approach to resource preservation and visitor education. It focuses on saving the best representative features associated with Route 66 and provides for planned visitor experiences. Strict criteria would be developed to guide the visitor experience, preservation, and interpretation of resources. Only those resources that meet specific criteria would be preserved and interpreted. A federal commission would help to coordinate and stimulate management action by cooperating partners.

2. THE ROUTE 66 NATIONAL HERITAGE CORRIDOR

Under this concept, visitors would be encouraged to explore the areas within a broad heritage corridor along Route 66, which would function as a central linking spine. The experience would be focused on the corridor, and visitors would be limited only by their individual imaginations. A consortium of states would help develop and encourage programs. Federal technical assistance would be provided.

3. ROUTE 66 COMMEMORATED

Under this concept, the road would be recognized as a commemorative highway. Designation, recognition, and informational/directional signing would be the only formal federal action. It would then be the decision of the states, counties, communities, and organizations along the corridor to adopt, preserve, interpret, or promote the route.

4. THE ROUTE 66 NATIONAL HISTORIC TRAIL

This concept would provide for the designation of Route 66 as a National Historic Trail unit of the national trails system. A national historic trail is dependent upon a partnership between the federal government (which administers the program) and grassroots organizations, agencies, and individuals, including private landowners (responsible for day-to-day management).

Come back to the Oklahoma Route 66 Association (State Office).


