TOURISM IS ONE OF STATE'S TOP INDUSTRIES

National Tourism Awareness Week is May 1-7. About 60,000 Oklahomans are employed in the tourism business. Visitors in our state spend in the range of \$2.5 billion dollars each year. When indirect spending is figured in, the range could be increased to \$4.8 billion.

Employees from tourist information centers at Colbert, Vinita, Miami, Thackerville and Erick have traveled around the state to become more familiar with what Oklahoma can offer travelers. Over 1.000.000 people stopped at the tourism centers in 1993.

If towns furnish the t-shirts, center employees are willing to be walking billboards. Special exhibits can showcase area attractions.

LARGE TRAVEL SHOW IN EUROPE

Europe's largest travel show was held in March at Berlin, Germany, Oklahoma sent representatives from the tourism department. They were to tell the world what Oklahoma has to offer the traveler. The building that houses this show is about 26 times the size of the Myriad Convention Center in Oklahoma City, It contains approximately 26 different halls. Taxl cabs providing transportation, made getting around a bit easler.

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The United States' pavilion is shaped like a capital U. The booths on the outside are set up for the general public. The booths on the inside are for the private and professional traveler.

The Dutch and Germans are the most widely traveled people in Europe. A lot of questions were asked at the Oklahoma booth, The Oklahoma Route 66 Association helped the Tourism Department with t-shirts that had the Route 66 and Native American theme in the design.

Europeans are used to booking their travel plans with an agent ahead of time. This could be an opportunity for Route 66 communities to get listed in tour guides for a particular area. Another opportunity that could help is to recognize and cash Eurochecks. These checks are like Traveler's checks used over in Europe. Route 66 businesses may want to inquire into what it takes to handle the exchange of this currency.

RODEO DAYS AT SHAMROCK, TEXAS

In June, the Shamrock Historic Route 66 Association is having a big celebration, Friday, June 17, a rodeo and free barbeque is scheduled. On Saturday, June 18, a parade will march down historic Route 66. A chuckwagon cook-off is the next event. Poker Runs are also going to be set up. Entrants can start in Oklahoma City or Amarillo. Saturday there is also a second night of rodeo and a boot-scootin' dance!

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the evening of the Fourth of July with an extravagant fireworks display, presented by Cherokee Nation Bingo Outpost and simulcast by KVOO.


Libertyfest is an opportunity for friends, family and neighbors to come together and celebrate as a community the heritage and history of this country.

LOOKIN' DOWN OL' ROUTE 66

High on the hill east of the Normal School in Edmond, Oklahoma stood the home of Dr. A.M. Ruhl, M.D.. A modest structure of one and a half stories, it was typical of the surrounding homes. A little girl, Floranna, played in the fenced in yard with her dolls and her family dog. A parrot was known to rest in its cage out front as the family enjoyed the front porch. Chrysanthemums grew around the yard, bringing praise for the Dr.'s green thumb. Dr. Ruhl could be seen having tea with Floranna out in the lawn or Mrs. Ruhl loving on her little girl on the front porch.

The 1920's brought change to the little house. The little girl was a young lady away at school. And Dr. and Mrs. Ruhl embarked on a most ambitious project, they had their home lifted up 12 feet to build a new first floor underneath. The original house was lowered down on the new construction. The newspaper described it as one of the most attractive homes in Edmond with it's new stucco finish and sun parlors.

As all of this was happening, an new highway was making it's way past the grand home of Dr. and Mrs.

Ruhl. One day known as Historic Route 66, the new highway brought people from across America past Dr. Ruhl's front porch. From the sun parlor, the family could now watch as the newest automobiles of the century drove by. Soon Dr. Ruhl was to pass away, but Ol' Route 66 was still there to keep Mrs. Ruhl company for almost 40 years. It brought her preclous daughter Floranna, and family, home to visit Grandma Ruhl.

Today, Floranna's family home still overlooks the hill where Ol' Route 66 comes up past the front porch. Now the home bears a new personality as The Arcadian Inn Bed & Breakfast. Floranna's friends, the Halls, now host many visitors brought to them by Ol' Route 66.

Decorated as Mrs. Ruhl might have dressed it up in the early part of the century, the home is a luxurious haven with Victorian charm and contemporary comfort. Guests enjoy homemade cooking, good reading, outdoor theater, and the outdoor spa that reminds them of Dr. Ruhl's goldfish pond. But most especially they enjoy sitting on the front porch "Lookin' down of Route 66".

The Arcadian Inn Bed & Breakfast overlooks Route 66 at First & University in Edmond. THE WELL

When the Route 66 Cruisers come through Vinita, they will be driving right on top of a piece of history; the site of Vinita's community Artisan well.

Many years ago, before Oklahoma became a state, Vinita had a community water well. It was located at the intersection of Illinois Avenue and Wilson Street, actually in the middle of the street. This location is now the intersection of Highway 66 and Highway 2, right on the Route 66 Cruise pathway.

During the great westward movements of the 1800's, this was a common stop for people moving across the continent seeking new lands. Some walked, some rode, but most came by covered wagons containing all



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their earthly goods.

In the next century, for many years the well was used by travelers on Route 66 to refill their radiators and as a general reason to stop in the thriving community of Vinita. Later, as progress created the need for larger and better roads, the well was covered over and is now deeply buried under the intersection. The rocks which lined its walls, however, are still in place and several were recovered in 1993 when the highways were undergoing renovation.

Be sure to look Vinita over carefully when you're on the Cruise. Vinita is the oldest incorporated town in Oklahoma and you'll be hearing a lot about this town and you should plan on making a return visit soon.
