

Joe is the most laid-back go-getter I've ever met. When he was working for the government he had a reputation of putting new organizations together. HELP NEEDED TO SAVE LANDMARK OK ROUTE 66 BRIDGE

All members are urged to join a letter writing campaign aimed at saving the classic steel-truss bridge on the Neosho River at Miami. As part of a road improvement project alongside old 66, the bridge is slated for demolition unless a new owner can be found by July 1996, according to officials at the Oklahoma Department of Transportation.

Opened in 1937, the bridge was the site of a celebration held to open the last paved section of Route 66 in Oklahoma. To date, the city of Miami has made no decision on whether to assume responsibility for the span. If they do not, someone else must, or the bridge will be destroyed. It is therefore vital that all of us write letters in support of saving the bridge.

Editor's note: During the annual meeting, the OK Route 66 Association unanimously voted to do all it can to save the bridge in Miami. Thanks to letter writing done to this date,

DOT has given supporters till July to find someone willing to "take possession", i.e. assume total responsibility for its maintenance and liabilities. Now it's up to us to persuade either the city of Miami or some group of individuals or businessmen to "take possession." If the Association had the money, it would step in and take control of the bridge, but sadly, it does not. Efforts also need to be made at the state legislative level to stop the attempts to destroy various OK Route 66 Bridges so we don't have to wage all out war every several months. If we allow our bridges and other Route 66 landmarks to be destroyed, there won't be anything left to draw tourists

From September 23rd to Dec. 31st,1995 approximately 5,944 visitors came to see Oklahoma's Route 66 Museum in Clinton. An economic impact of \$548,159 was spent in Oklahoma Restaurants, motels, service stations, and other business firms during that same time frame.

In 1995, 27 Historical Society Museums and sites attracted 536,975 visitors for a dollar impact of 39.5 Million.

Mark you calendars now! The Oklahoma Route 66 Association is sponsoring three cruises this year. The first one will take place June 1 and 2 and will cover The eastern one half of the state-Quapaw/Oklahoma City. The second one is scheduled for September 14 and 15 and will cover the western half - Oklahoma City/Texola. The third cruise will be October 11 and 12 and is basically a caravan to Vega, Texas (the Road's midpoint) to celebrate the 70th Birthday of Route 66.

Kick-off/pre-registration parties for the first two cruises will be held at both ends of the planned route. Saturday morning, cruisers will leave from either end, meeting somewhere in the middle by evening. Closing ceremonies will be held on Sunday. This schedule should allow for more enjoyable driving pace on Saturday and gives everyone a chance to get together that evening for dinner Imagine, no more rushing to end closing ceremonies before people faint from hunger or it's to dark to see!! John Ackenhausen is in charge of the eastern cruise, Carol Duncan - the western.

The third cruise will head out to Vega, Texassome 30 miles west of Amarillo. It's being held in conjunction with the national Run to the Heartland event. People from all over the U.S. will be participating in this run. Sue Kendall has been in contact with sponsors and will provide more information as it becomes available. But as of now, she reports motel space is going fast. The Best Western in Vega may or may not have room space by the time you call (806)267-2131. Rates are \$58 a night - that's for 2 double beds/4 people. Ask them about singles, if that category applies. The Vega Chamber of Commerce has set aside 25 rooms at the Comfort Inn on the west side of Amarillo, they are available for \$45 a night, whether it's one person or four. Call (800)628-5013, Ask for De Giles (Pronounced Dee, Giles With a hard G) and tell her you are calling for the Route 66 celebration. There is also

the Texan Motel In Wildorado, which is 13 miles west of Vega, but we don't have any information from them yet. Actual cruise plans for this event are a bit vague right now, but if you want to participate in the caravan (or caravans) heading out there we'll need to know by the end of June or July.


