NEW DIRECTOR FOR ROUTE 66 MUSEUM

An announcement has been made by Executive Director J. Blake Wade and Museums' Director Kathy Dickson of the Oklahoma Historical Society. A new Director for the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton has been selected. His name is John R. Hill.

Mr. Hill is originally from Oklahoma City. He graduated from the University of Central Oklahoma with a bachelor's degree and earned his masters at Oklahoma State University.

John served for a time as architectural historian for the State Historic Preservation Office from 1983 to 1989. He directed the Historic Sites Division from 1990 to 1992, when he became Director of the Idaho State Historical Society. He also served as State Historic Preservation Officer in Idaho.

The Association Board Members are looking forward to working with Mr. Hill on preserving and promoting Oklahoma Route 66. Association members are encouraged to stop by and meet John and view the new changes and exhibits he has already instituted at the museum.

The museum continues to attract many visitors

from foreign countries and from all over the United States. Once the people of Elk City finish the National Route 66 Museum in 1998, Oklahoma will be the home of two first-rate Route 66 museums. Truly, Oklahoma is the heart of U.S. Highway 66.

THIEVES TAKE CHILDREN'S CARS AT GEARY

Each year in September, the Geary Chamber of Commerce sponsors a city carnival and fair. But this year may be a big disappointment for the children.

Sometime during the first week of June, thieves broke into the Geary city storage building and stole the kiddie cars from one of the rides and tried to steal three of the train cars from the miniature train.

Unless the cars are found or others can be donated or purchased, the kids won't get to enjoy the ride this fall. The kiddie cars were old pedal cars attached to metal arms. They were connected to a framework powered by a motor. The cars would travel in a circle on a concrete path. The thieves took the ride's eight vehicles and a spare car. Two airplanes, two fire engines, two tractors, and three cars made up the ride's vehicles.

Many parents have fond memories of riding in the various vehicles when they were children and they looked forward to bringing their toddlers to enjoy the ride of fun and imagination.

In recent years, pedal cars have grown in value to collectors. Some range in dollar value from \$300 to over \$1000. The Geary Chamber of Commerce is offering a \$500 reward for the return of the stolen cars. But the collector value is not the issue here. The real loss is that someone out there is so hard of heart that they would steal from childhood the laughter and giggles generated by the simple pleasures of an old fashioned ride while robbing parents and grandparents of a chance to pass on a generational joy.

**INDIAN ART CENTER
ENVISIONED FOR SAYRE**

The Sayre City Council has given their approval for noted sculptor Andrew Lester to provide a place for young Indian artists to create their artistry and sell their work.

The idea is to bring a Native American Art Center to Western Oklahoma. The art center would feature traditional art, a memorial to people in Oklahoma history, a training center, and a library. The money from the sales would go to the artists' families.

It was a matter of timing for this project. The Washita Battle Site is located a few miles away near Cheyenne. The site has been declared a National Historic Site and local businesses are hoping tourists will want to come and learn about what happened that day in 1868.

The old Sayre High School building is not being used and could be an ideal location with 13,000 square feet of space. Old and historical buildings can be utilized to meet modern needs. A lease agreement is in the works.

As always, money is the bottom line. Mr. Lester is looking for grant money or private donations to help him realize his dream.

Lester's sculptures include David Crockett, Jim Thorpe, Chief Black Kettle, Ben Johnson, Mickey Mantle, and President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

HEISCH RECEIVES HIGH HONOR

Congratulations to Melvena Heisch, Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer for the Oklahoma Historical Society. Melvena received 1 of only 17 1996 Preservation Honor Awards at the October conference of the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

Ms. Heisch is a pioneer for promoting Oklahoma's rich heritage including Route 66, Oklahoma Main Street Program, the Statewide Preservation Conference, the non-profit Preservation Oklahoma, Inc., archeology, farms and ranches, historic houses, and pioneer women. The nomination also notes her quick actions following the Murrah building bombing even though she was severely injured


SPOTLIGHT ON MIAMI MAIN STREET

The Miami Beauty Collage at 3 North Main Street is in one of Miami's oldest buildings - 1902 - with the only intact cast iron front. During the summer and fall of 1996, owner Brenda Stockwell removed metal panels from the upper floor windows to reveal the original windows topped with metal sunbursts. She removed an aluminum canopy, exposed transoms, repaired all original metal and wood details, and then painted. The project was completed with a new canvas awning and sign. 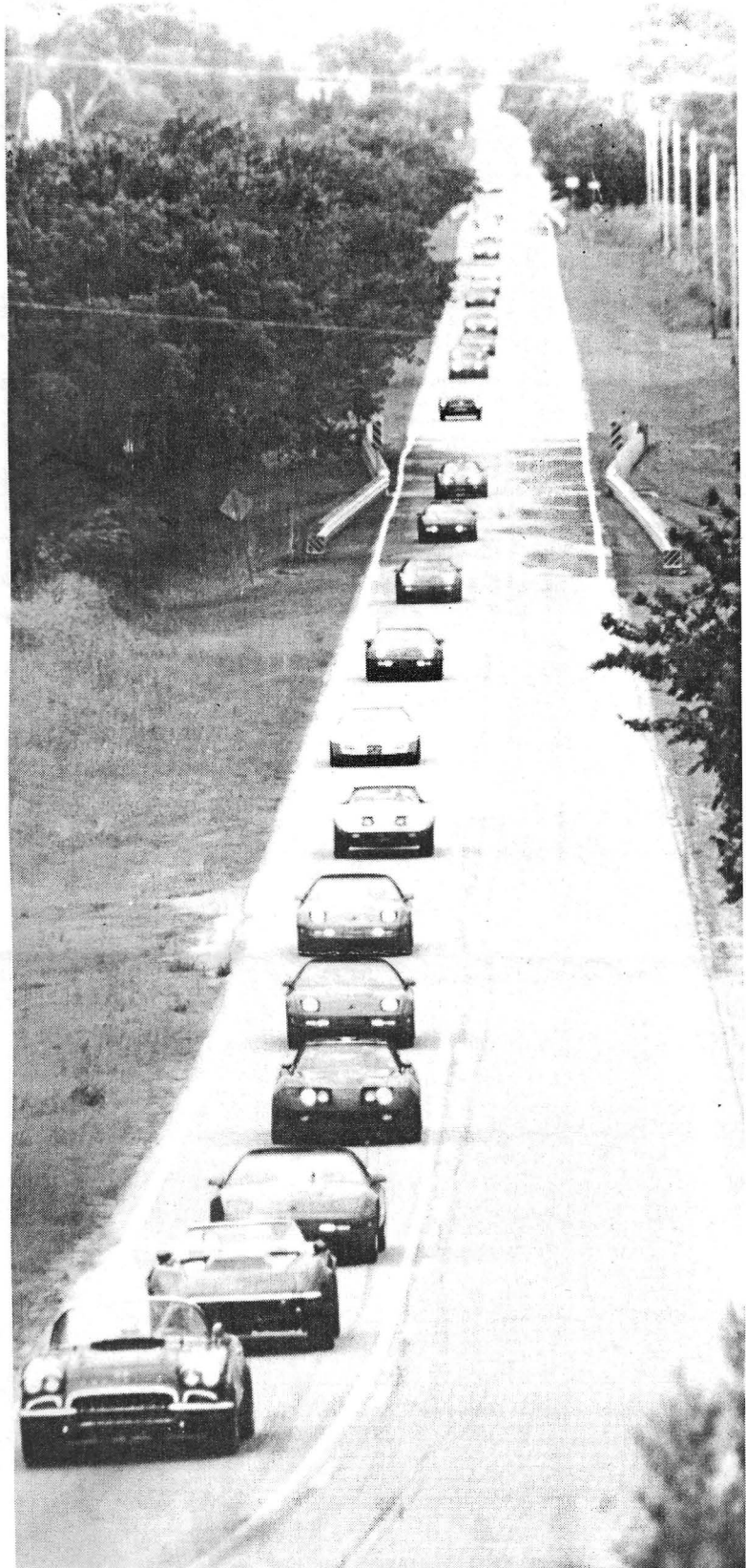
OKLAHOMA SCENIC BYWAYS PROGRAM

In August of 1997 the OU Center for Business and Economic Development completed and delivered the final version of the Oklahoma Scenic Byways Study to the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department. The study makes several recommendations concerning the enactment and formation of a scenic byways program for Oklahoma.

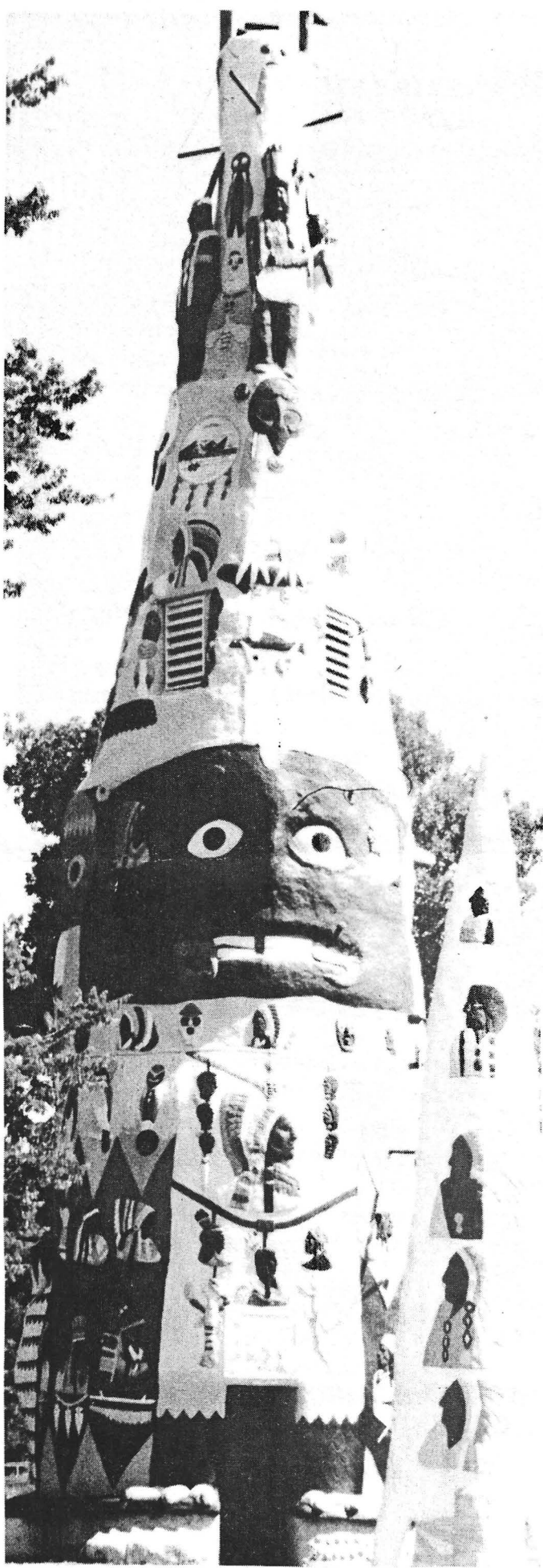
Currently, a list of nominees to serve on the Scenic Byways Advisory Council is being assembled. The Advisory Council will act as the program's oversight and reviewing body. The Council will review program applications and make recommendations to Tourism and the Dept. Of Transportation for official designation as an Oklahoma Scenic Byway for routes meeting program criteria.

Oklahoma Scenic Byways will introduce visiting motorists to the natural beauty, cultural diversity, and historic aura that makes Oklahoma a truly unique experience. Roadways eligible for nomination must be considered significant in at least one of six categories: scenic, historic, natural, cultural, recreational, or archeological. All routes receiving official designation as an Oklahoma Scenic Byway will be delineated as such on the Official State Map. Once finalized, the Program will make a strong impact in creating increased economic development through tourism expenditures.

From the list of above criteria, Route 66 through Oklahoma qualifies on several counts. In other states that have a Scenic Byways Program, Route 66 has easily qualified. Several people affiliated with our Association are actively involved in this Oklahoma program and we will keep you informed as things develop. We had hoped that the destruction of the old steel truss bridge over the Neosho River in Miami could be postponed until this program could become a reality. Careful consideration and planning could then have been undertaken to determine how to best utilize this historical and unique landmark. But when the forces of destruction can't be persuaded to wait and the community itself seems to be blind to the treasure it possesses, another irreplaceable landmark is lost.

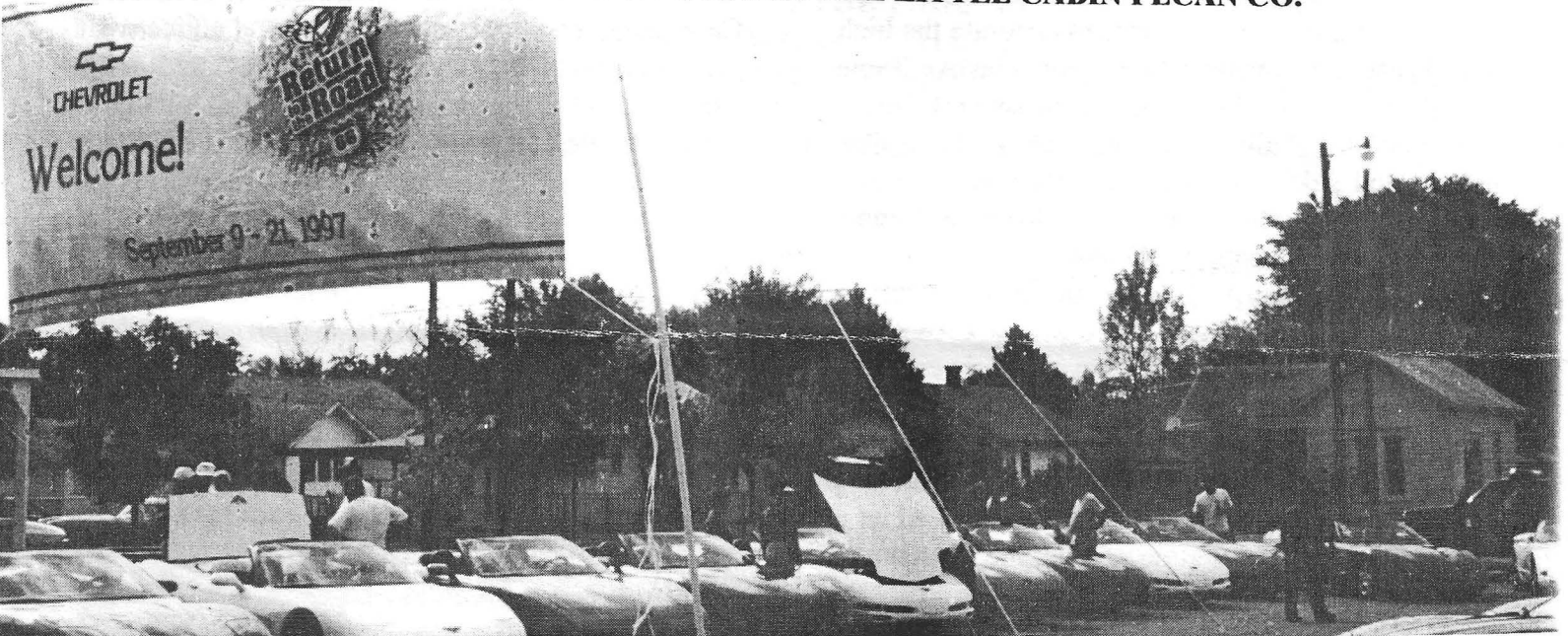

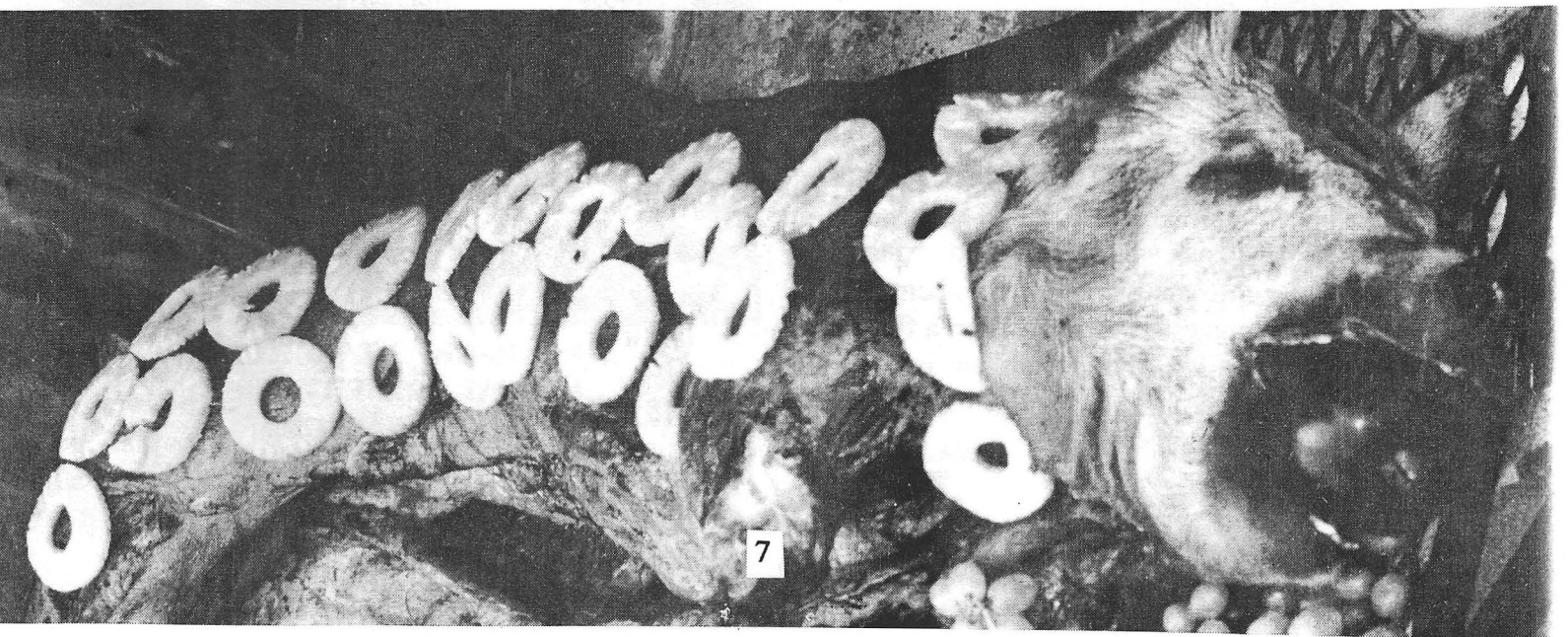

A LETTER FROM THE CASSEL'S (Condensed)

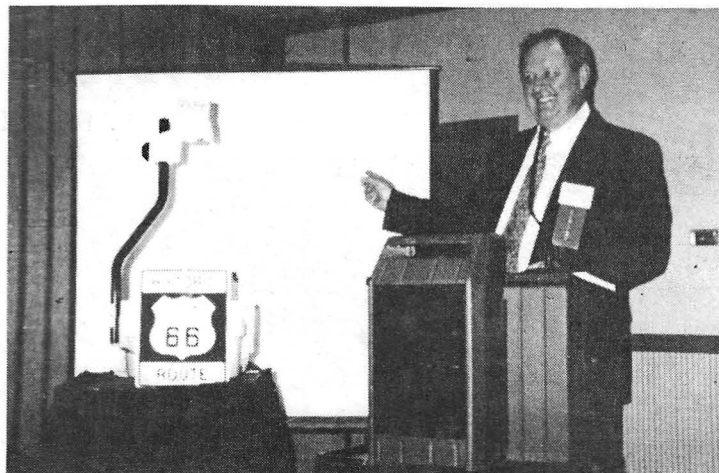
