President's Corner

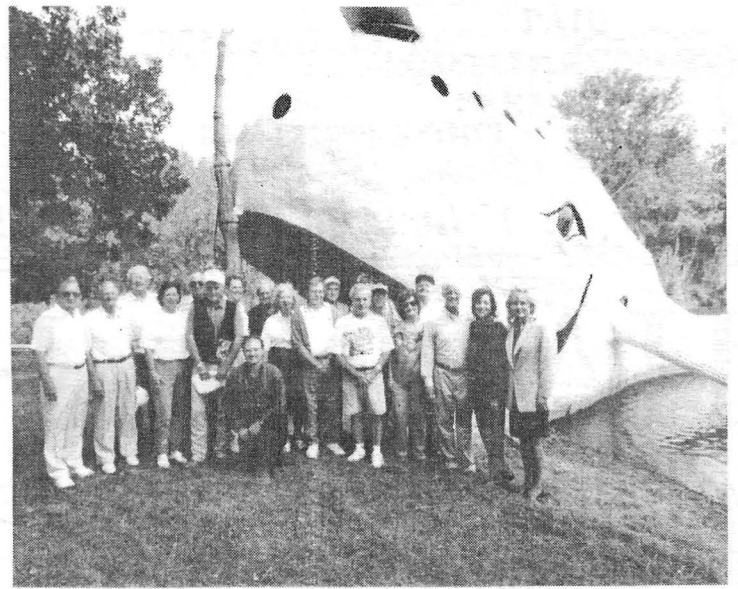

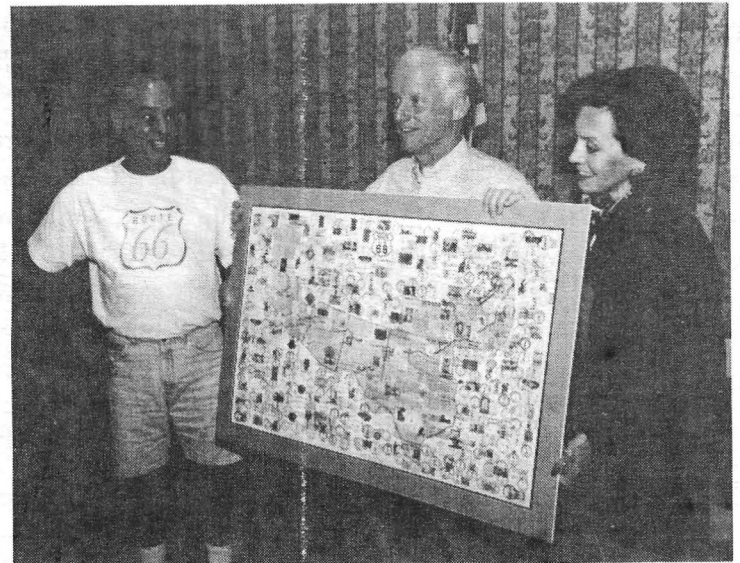

National Route 66 Bill Goes Down in Defeat For Now

The National Historic Route 66 Federation reports that the National Route 66 Bill has been defeated in the 105th Session of Congress. On the encouraging side, they've been told that it will be re-introduced in 1999 during the next session of Congress.

In a nutshell, the Senate passed the bill, but the House shot it down – and along party lines at that. The Roll Call vote #534 shows 201 Ayes (193 Republicans and 8 Democrats) and 190 Noes (12 Republicans, 177 Democrats and 1 Independent). If you want to see how your House rep voted, on the Internet go to: thomas.loc.gov/home/thomas2.html. Then under the section called Bills, click on 105th Session – 2nd (1998). This will take you to a page where you can click on Roll 534. This will show you the voting record.

If you want to go through all the details of the Senate and House bill and especially the Senate Committee Report 399 to check out the comments from Jarvis of the Interior who had some problems with the bill, start your search from the above basic home page and type in S.2133 – which is the Senate Bill number. It will take some wading and going through a lot of layers, but it is interesting.

David Knudson, Executive Director of the Federation, said in an e-mail to Kathy Anderson, "We thought it would be a shoe-in once it passed the Senate. Besides, who could vote against such a logical and helpful bill? Unfortunately, the vote went right down party lines. The bill was used to make a political point against Domenici and his budget and the Republicans. So, what you always expected is true. Politicians are much more interested in their parties than in the people. The Route runs right through the districts of 17 of those Democrats."

At the time, David had been told that it would be brought up again, just before the Session adjourned for good, where a simple majority vote could get it passed. Unfortunately, according to a second e-mail from David, the Republicans moved to adjourn the session, forgetting to bring it up for a vote.

Folks, Route 66 has been pronounced dead before, yet she has a way of beating the odds. Let's use this time before the next session to lobby all the house representatives so we can get this bill passed!

1999 Oklahoma Route 66 Hall of Fame Nominees Sought

Okay, members, put on your thinking caps. It's time to nominate one living person and one deceased person to our OK Route 66 Hall of Fame. Previous winners are Michael Wallis, Jack Cutberth, and Don Mullinex. All you have to do to nominate someone is write down his or her name and several paragraphs on why they should be nominated. Just writing in a name will not suffice.

Get your nominations and reasons to the Association at Post Office Box 21382, Oklahoma City, OK 73156 no later than January 15. John Ackenhausen and Mary Sue Kendall are the selection review committee and will make their decision based on the information received. The winners will be announced at the Annual Meeting January 30th.

If you have nominated someone, assuming they are in the living category, you might want to make sure they attend the annual meeting because the winners will not be notified in advance.

Duplicate plaques honoring the winners will be displayed at the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton.

The city of McLean is also working on wall murals that reflect Route 66 and the era of the Main Street of America.

The group had lunch at the community hall in Mobeetie. The Mayor and the historical group were there. This was an excellent opportunity to talk about Route 66 and what we are doing in Oklahoma as well as to get acquainted with other Roadies.

After lunch, off we went to the county museum complex. The old jail has been converted into an illustration of local history. Other buildings at the complex reflect different buildings as they were originally. The latest project is to restore an early day rancher's house. While we were there, we rode on parts of the DCO and Ft. Elliot highways. Is there anyone out

there who knows about these highways?

We arrived back in Shamrock around 4ish. Time to go to the community center and set up our Association's booth. I concentrated on information about our Association and what we try to do to promote Oklahoma Route 66. 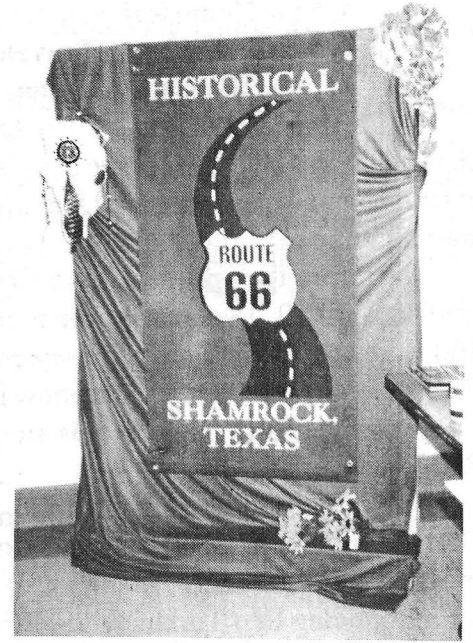
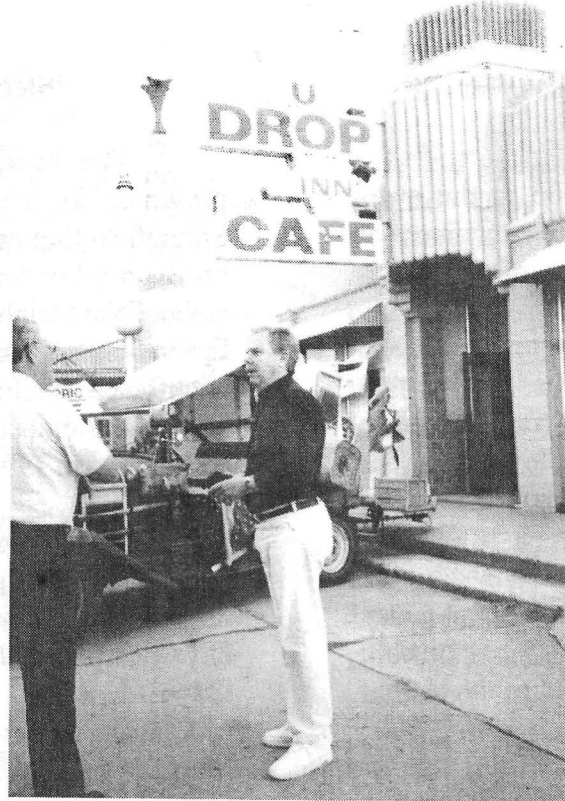
Jim Ross and Jerry McClanahan showed some of their slides with commentary from each. Make sure you catch their new video!

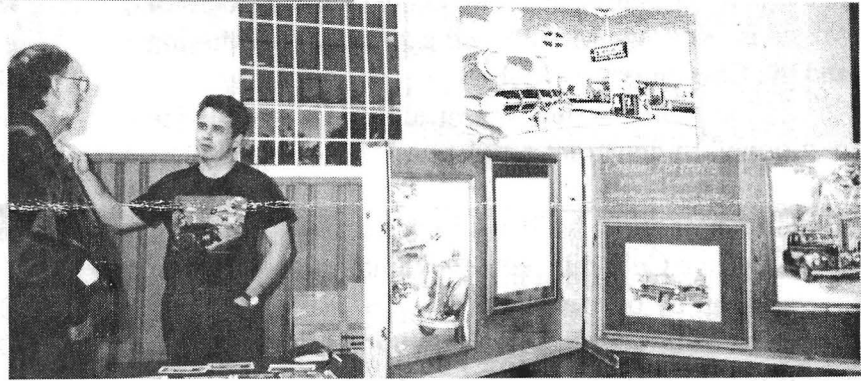
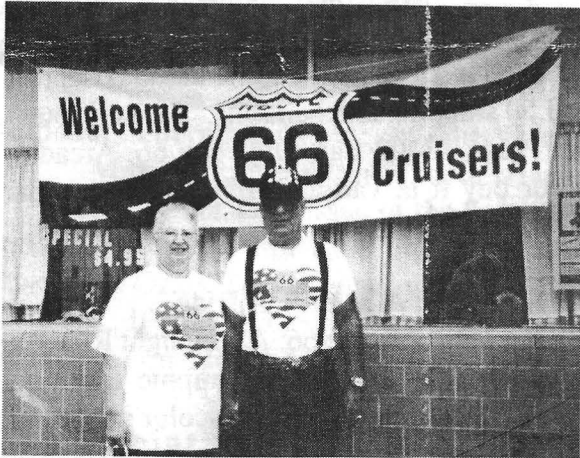
Lucille Hamons was also there. She told me she was going on to Amarillo for the rest of the week.

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A New Historical Marker Awaits the Route 66 Traveler

Part of the charm of Route 66 is the ever-changing sights and additions to see. The enticement of entertainment, amazement, and historical information is waiting to lure the traveler.

Before the opening of the Cheyenne-Arapahoe land on April 19, 1892, each tribe member was allotted 160 acres. The Indian names were translated into English for legal purposes. Somehow in this process the Cheyenne woman's name in this story got changed to Red Wheat.

The Mennonite Church established the Darlington School near the Darlington Indian Agency located near Fort Reno. Mennonites were responsible for introducing Red Turkey winter wheat to the United States in the 1870s.

The woman, Red Wheat, deeded a 20-acre tract to the General Conference Mennonite Church Board of Missions. Rev. and Mrs. J.B. Ediger served the Mission and the Cheyenne people for 40 years.

Parts of the Red Wheat allotment were twice partitioned to construct a railroad and Route 66. The new red granite marker is located on the south side of Route 66, east of the Mohawk Lodge on the location of the Cheyenne Cultural Center in Clinton.

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Andy Payne Statue Unveiled

The bronze, life-size statue of Andrew Hartley Payne, winner of the Great Transcontinental Footrace and clerk of the Oklahoma Supreme Court for 36 years, was unveiled during ceremonies on September 19 in the Foyil City Park on Highway 66.

A crowd of about 200 attended the ceremony, along with several family members including Andy's widow Vivian and his son, James, and his wife; his grandson, Ian; his sister-in-law Doris Payne and nephew, Gerry Payne; and an aunt and two sisters.

Clem McSpadden served as master of ceremonies. Special recognition was given to Jim Reed, a member of the Foyil Heritage Association and Rogers County Historical Society, who initiated the statue project and fund raising efforts, constructed the statue base, and then transported the statue to the park upon its completion.

Editor's note: The statue appears to be a duplicate of the original which is located in Tahlequah at the Cherokee National Museum.

Oklahoma Association Trip Guide Ad Rates to Increase

If you are one of our valued advertisers in our Annual Trip Guide, listen up. After much soul searching and debate, the Board has decided to raise the ad rates. This came about when, due to rising printing costs, we came up short of our goal of being able to print 30,000 Guides in 1998. The new ad rates are as follows:

Business card size/1/8th page: \$40

¼ page: \$75.00

½ page: \$145.00

Full page: \$280.00

The discount for repeat advertisers has been discontinued.

Despite the increase, the rates are still extremely reasonable. No other publication in Oklahoma specifically targets and serves the Route 66 traveler. The Guides are virtually gone within three months of printing. We could probably triple our printing run and still not meet the demand.

We realize that some folks may not be able to buy the same sized ad space as they did before, but \$40 for a business-card sized ad (actually larger than a real business card) is still a great bargain. Especially when you realize that the Guides go to the Welcome Centers as well as to the businesses that actually bought ads.

So, if you own a business on Route 66 in Oklahoma – or Texas or Kansas for that matter – please advertise with us! We've got a space just waiting for you.

We donated the Fresno to the Clinton Route 66 Museum where you will see my Dad's and my cousin's names on the plaque above the Fresno. Museum. We drove our Corvair and were the only non-Corvette in the group.

Retha enjoyed all of the Route 66 events and trips. I miss her tremendously and I am sure all of you who knew her will miss her when I drive up without her while endeavoring to get on with my life. May God bless and keep her until I, too, take the Corvair Chariot and join her at the upper end of the Golden Route 66.

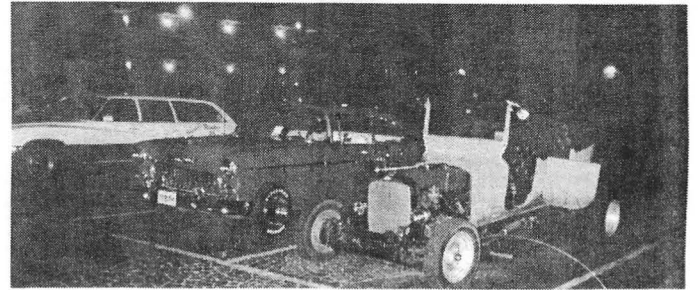
The Quest was touring Route 66 to find the roots of Rock "N" Roll and they found more than they were looking for when they came to Oklahoma.

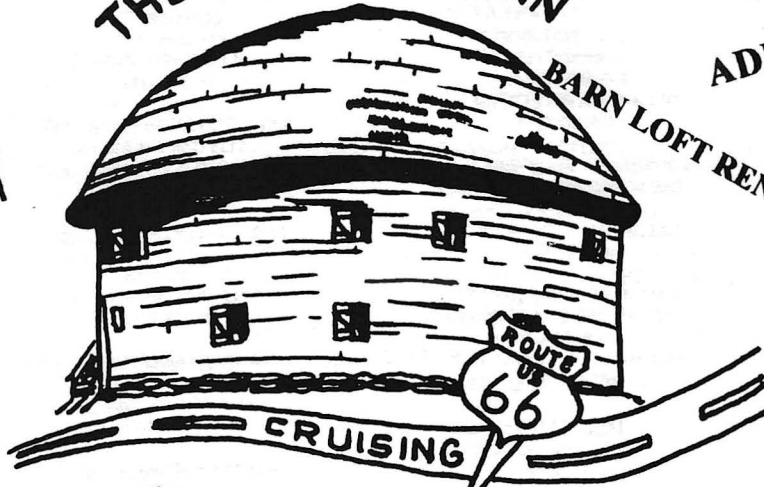
