SAD NEWS FROM WESTERN OKLAHOMA

For those of you who haven't heard the sad news, yet, Lucille Hamons, a true Route 66 Icon, passed away Friday, August 18, 2000. Lucille, affectionately called the "Mother of the Mother Road", had been a fixture on Route 66, at her place just west of Hydro, Oklahoma, for almost 60 years.

Services, attended by many friends and family, were held at the Blackstone funeral home in Weatherford, Oklahoma on Tuesday August 22. After the services, the funeral procession drove along Route 66 from Weatherford to Hydro with a stop at Lucille's place. While at Lucille's, I spoke of some of the memories I will always have of Lucille. In September of 1999 we had elected Lucille to the Oklahoma Route 66 Hall of Fame. On the Saturday of the induction ceremonies, Cheryl Nowka, one of Lucille's daughters and our Web Site manager, had told me about how worried Lucille was about having nothing interfering with her being in Clinton for the induction ceremonies. She had even made the statement that if she had to she was going to walk from her place to Clinton just to be sure she was there on time. I thought to myself, "Yeah, that's Lucille."

Back a few months ago, when I was writing the President's Corner for the June newsletter, I was pleading for some of our association members to step up and volunteer for some of the many positions that need to be filled. I got one telephone call; it was Lucille volunteering to do whatever she could to help out.

Lucille was laid to rest in the Hydro cemetery, just north of town.

Lucille, you will truly be missed by all of us Route 66 Road Warriors.

Editor's Note: Cheryl Nowka is in the process of establishing the Lucille Hamons Memorial Insurance Fund, a non-profit organization to help businesses along the Route pay insurance costs. Exhibit pays tribute to Route 66 icon

A year ago, on August 2, 1999, Pop Hicks' Restaurant was destroyed by fire. The famous road icon was considered to be one of the longest continuously operating restaurants on Route 66 – 63 years, from 1936 to 1999.

A special tribute exhibit is on display at the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum from August 1-15, 2000. The exhibit was the result of the combined efforts of Pat Smith, director, Andy Watson, curator, and Virgil Smith, museum volunteer, the Oklahoma Route 66 Association, and Vera Hicks Moore, daughter of E.E. 'POP' Hicks.

The first café was known as Bradford's Café. The name was changed to Pop Hicks' Café after Mr. Hicks took over. Eventually "café" changed to "restaurant." So, as the story goes, the name was never changed again even after several owners managed the business. Mr. and Mrs. Howard Nichols were the last people to operate the famed Route 66 business.

The exhibit showed quotes and headlines on one display panel, a brief pictorial history of the business on another panel, and a '90s highlight story on the third panel.

Accompanying the display was a memorabilia showcase with several items such as menus, water glasses, coffee cups, an old postcard, and many other interesting objects. A recently taken photo display with a writing tablet for recording memories completed the tribute.

Mr. Michael Wallis, Route 66 author and noted road warrior, wrote a special tribute of his own, especially for the occasion. Mr. Wallis stopped at Pop Hicks' Restaurant many times during his travels.

The BBQ place is gone as is the Pony Ride Building.

Route 66 travelers will also notice that the famous yellow and black Buffalo Ranch sign is gone too. A semi turned over on top of the sign, flattening it. The owner has no plans to put a replica in its place.

Despite the changes, Betty Wheatley's Buffalo Ranch Dairy Bar is still going strong. However, after 43 years of making buffalo burgers and milkshakes, she plans to sell the business. So be sure to stop by her place and wish her all the best.

Claremore's Belvidere Mansion moves to next phase

In 1991, the Rogers County Historical Society purchased the Belvidere. Many volunteer hours and donations have been spent restoring the mansion. They are still hoping to raise funds for a wrought iron fence, elevator, central air conditioning, and more. However, the most pressing need is to pay off the loan of \$65,000 the Society took out in order to buy the mansion.

The group's goal is to be debt-free by the end of 2001. Any major additional restoration needs will be delayed until the loan is paid in full. The mansion is located at the SW corner of Chickasaw and 4th. You might write the Rogers County Historical Society at P.O. Box 774, Claremore, OK 74018.

Stroud School progress

A structural analysis of the old Stroud School slated for destruction by the Turnpike Authority has revealed that the sandstone exterior walls are in excellent shape. Given this encouraging news, plus the willingness of the Turnpike Authority to quick-claim deed the building and land free and clear with enough space for fencing and parking, the Stroud Historic Neighborhood Association has voted to receive the property if it passes legal and environmental muster by their attorney.

Chandler in the news

Another fine old building along Oklahoma Route 66 has gone up in smoke. The Fuquay Building, constructed in 1901 and located on the corner of 9th and Manvel, was gutted by fire. It housed Chandler Hardware and the Chandler Chamber of Commerce. The building was so badly damaged that it was torn down.

Everyone's invited to celebrate's Chandler's 109th birthday on September 27 (one day early) by coming to lunch from 11 to 1:30 at the Chandler Christian Church, 614 Manvel in the basement Fellowship Hall. Tickets are \$4. The city was established by its own special land run in 1891 as was Pottawatomie County's Tecumseh because surveys were not completed in time for the other counties-side run on Sept. 22.

The Museum of Pioneer History is now open on Saturdays from 9:30 am to 2:30 pm, free to the public, as usual.

New National Register of Historic Places Listings

Among 14 new properties to be listed on the Register are several in Oklahoma Route 66 towns: El Reno High School, built in 1911; El Reno Municipal Pool Bathhouse, built in 1935; Tulsa's U.S. Post Office and Courthouse; the Sayre Rock Island Depot, built in 1927; and St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, built in 1899.

New Route 66 book released

The University of Oklahoma Press has just published a new Route 66 book. The author is Quinta Scott and the title is "Along Route 66." This book is a composite of photos and text and combines the architectural history of the buildings with the history of the people that built, lived in, and used them to earn a living.

Quinta Scott is a professional photographer living in St. Louis. Many Route 66 fans are familiar with one of her earlier works "Route 66: The Highway and Its People," co-authored with Susan Croce Kelly.

We hope to have a review of this book in the next issue of the newsletter.

Learning Channel documentary

As you may recall, when our band of protesters met out on Spur 281, a video crew from Conspiracy Theory Productions was there to record the events. We still don't know if any of the protest has made it into the final version of the documentary but an air date has been set: December 15, 8 pm on the Learning Channel. We don't know if that is 8 pm eastern, central, mountain or pacific, so be prepared!

Association members meet with ODOT

On June 27th, John Ackenhausen, Carol Duncan, Kathy Anderson (representing the Association), and Don and Sally Ferrell (representing the Lincoln County Historical Society and the Association) along with members of the State Historic Preservation Office met with several Oklahoma Department of Transportation planning division officials.

During the Spur 281 protest, our Association requested to be put on the environmental impact early notification list for any projects that might affect Oklahoma Route 66. As a result, when ODOT began considering some projects for Lincoln County, we were notified. Hence the June 27 meeting.

ODOT passed out a map indicating some 8 projects they would like to do along the SH 66 corridor in Lincoln County. Most seem to be widening the existing two lanes to a more standard

width and improving the shoulders where feasible. In addition, 3 bridges are under consideration for replacement – one over Chuckaho Creek between Chandler and Davenport, and two in the Wellston area – one of which is the old truss bridge at Captain Creek. The other is on 66B and we believe that it is a newer concrete structure and not the older truss bridge that is under consideration. The astounding thing was that the ODOT survey team, who was present at the meeting, couldn't remember! We had kind of expected photos or something a bit more informative than the map and people's memories!!

During our meeting, ODOT was quite interested in finding out what our priorities/concerns were about the Road. They admitted the furor raised over the Spur 281 section was one they do not wish to go through again. John, our President, made it quite clear that where old paving still exists, that its preservation was our first concern. Same with the truss bridges. But if the road had already been paved over, then preserving buildings/roadside structures was foremost.

Sally and Don were concerned that widening the pavement in Lincoln County might endanger some roadside attractions so everyone kind of mentally traveled the route to see if any came to mind. A thought spoken aloud about improving pullouts at spots (like the Meramec Caverns Barn) then raised concerns about altering the character of the Route.

We were quite concerned that DOT intended to 4-lane 66 in Lincoln County but they assured us they had no such plans and did not see a need with the Turnpike running so close by. We did express our concern about losing the little Truss bridge near Wellston. We stressed the fact that the Road was a tourist attraction and these unique bridges were rare along the Route and that travelers really enjoyed them. The old bridges, like the old paving, are hallmarks of being truly on 66.

Interestingly enough, this is where a distinction was made between the Historic Preservation community and members of our Association. For preservationists, if a structure cannot be salvaged,

then don't try to replace it with something similar. It would be dishonest, like Disneylanding the 66 experience. From the association's perspective, it would be nice to replace a too narrow truss bridge with a wider one – it would maintain that time travel feeling.

Both views thought that if either of the options was not workable, then perhaps putting in an interesting looking bridge would be preferable over a vanilla one that drivers zipped over without even realizing they'd been on a bridge.

We also talked about the Historic Route signs and how so many were missing and was it ODOT who had put them up to begin with? Apparently so, but they had no idea that the signs were being stolen. They promised to check into costs for new ones, but we have not heard anything back.

No promises were made at the meeting – it was, after all, just to notify us that ODOT was planning on doing some work and they now know what we feel about it. There are no surprises – and that was the whole point.

Association's web site receives award

Hats off to Cheryl Nowka, the creator of our Oklahoma Association's web site!

Our site was selected as a Links2Go "Key Resource" in the Route 66 topic. Out of 50 pages selected as Key Resources per topic every quarter, our site ranked number 4.

Each quarter, Links2Go samples millions of web pages to determine which pages are most heavily cited by web page authors. The most popular pages are downloaded and automatically categorized by topic. The Key Resource Award goes to the most relevant pages related to a particular topic, based on statistical measures applied to an extremely large data set.
