OKLAHOMA ROUTE 66 NEEDS YOU!

Recently, we mailed out membership cards and survey forms to most of our current members – some 200 individuals, families and business members. We are trying to update/correct our database as well as identify those members who would like to actively participate in our Association. So we ask that you please take the time to fill out the survey form and mail it back to us by mid-September.

If you did not receive a card, this means either your membership has expired or will be expiring within the next month or two. Please check the expiration date on your mailing label, then fill out the membership form found within this newsletter and mail in your renewal. Once we receive your check, we will send your membership card and its accompanying survey form.

For many years, the Association has been unable to issue membership cards, yet according to our Bylaws we should. Sometimes this has been due to a lack of funds, but mainly it's been because, as much as we all love Route 66 in Oklahoma and faithfully renew our memberships each year, there are just too few members willing to actually put in some time to help out.

During our 2001 Cruise, some of our Board members were approached by individuals who noticed that so few people were doing all the work. They said, "We'd be glad to help – all you have to do is ask!"

Well, we're asking. That is what the survey form is all about. We have every intention of making next year's cruise even better, but we need the extra volunteers to help (and we're all volunteers in this group – no paid staff here!). No special skills are required – just a warm smile and a willingness to help.

And we need help in more than just the cruise. Are you interested in preservation? We have several committees that you should be on. Want to get your town more involved in 66? Become a county rep, or be our liaison to your community, or get involved in our Trip Guide publication. Do you know neat stories about people who live (or lived) on 66 in Oklahoma? Write a story that we can put in our newsletter. There is much to be done, but we need your help.

The Oklahoma Route 66 Association is truly volunteer-run. We are the only state-wide organization dedicated to celebrating, preserving, and protecting the Mother Road in Oklahoma. We were formed in 1989 by a committee made up of the Oklahoma Depts. of Tourism and Recreation, Commerce, Transportation, and Historical Society. Communities and businesses up and down the Route in Oklahoma look to us for help. Other Route 66 states watch to see what we do too. So get involved – let's make "Mom" proud and ensure she survives for generations to come.



President's Corner by Kathy Anderson

Recently, Bill Fernau, our Federal Programs Coordinator, and I met with Melvena Heisch of the Oklahoma State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) and Mark Taylor of the National Park Service. Mark is the administrator of the Route 66 Corridor Act Program and was in town to meet with us about the funds now available for Route 66 in Oklahoma.

Melvena submitted a comprehensive threepronged proposal, which Mark approved. One: update the 1980s survey of the historic buildings and structures along all the various alignments. dating from 1926 up to 1970. Two: administer \$50,000 in funding/rehab matching grants for building repair, etc. for buildings on the National Register of Historic Places (buildings that are eligible but not registered can apply but would not have the same priority). Three: a comprehensive road documentation project which would include detailed mapping/photos (including historic bridges and sections of original paving) as well a priorities and management strategy (to be created by meeting with ODOT, County Commissioners, SHPO, and the Association) to issue guidelines for future repairs of the road and bridges.

The Oklahoma SHPO proposal is unique among the 8 Route 66 states. Most asked for funds to update or create surveys and some asked for matching grant monies to restore specific structures. But no other SHPO has offered to administer funds (there is no monies given to them to do this – not even for postage!) and no other state will have the thorough road mapping and strategy to address future repairs.

Melvena's office will handle Parts 1 and 2. Part 3 involves us. We are being asked to sign and execute a cooperative agreement in order to fulfill the mapping, photographic, narrative, and strategic planning goals – for a dollar amount we have yet to determine. For those of you familiar with Jim Ross' new *Oklahoma Route 66* book, you know that Jim has already a head-start on the mapping aspect. Knowing this, Melvena wrote Jim's name into the contract.

With the monies we receive from SHPO via the Route 66 Program, the Association will pay Jim for his time and expertise as well as the expenses associated with the various printouts, modifications, photographic demands, creation of the necessary documents, etc. which will hopefully be done by an enthusiastic team of 66ers, and not just the usual same 3 or 4 folks.

In the next several weeks the Board will be hammering out details as to exactly how much money we will request from SHPO in order to complete Step 3 and how best to accomplish this exciting project.

All eyes are on Oklahoma to see what kind of strategy we develop in order to preserve our old bridges and original sections of roadbed.

Incidentally, although only \$500,000 was allocated this year, it appears that only \$450,000 may be budgeted next year. Please write your US Senator or Congressman and urge them to boost the allocation back up to the authorized one million per year.

75th Anniversary Cruise and Car Show a big success

The Oklahoma Route 66 Association wrapped up its three-day 75th Anniversary of the Mother Road Cruise and Car Show celebration with closing ceremonies on Sunday July 15th at Route 66 Traders Flea Market in Yukon. (Hats off and a big thank-you to Jerald Ashby and his family at Route 66 Traders Flea Market – you and your facility were awesome!) Some 190 cars and over 310 passport-bearing cruisers set out from Erick and Miami on Friday and Saturday July 13 & 14 to travel their half of Oklahoma Route 66.

The weary but enthusiastic participants turned in their passports Saturday evening and early Sunday morning, after visiting the 15 communities and 30-plus possible checkpoints found in their half of the statewide run. Several hundred found the energy to enjoy the great sock hop hosted on Saturday night by KOMA's Kent Jones.

While all waited anxiously for 2 PM on Sunday to roll around, when the drawings for the various door prizes would begin, everyone checked out the 80-plus classic cars that were on display at the Association's companion Car Show.

"I think nearly every single cruiser I talked to was convinced that our Grand Door Prize of the 1966 Mustang GT Coupe was going to be theirs," chuckled John Ackenhausen, Executive Director of the Oklahoma Route 66 Association. "We started giving out our other door prizes at 2, then at 3, we put all the tickets back in the bucket for the Mustang drawing."

Once everything was ready, Rick Schmigle, Eastern Vice President of the Oklahoma Route 66 Association, walked over to the Mustang. The crowd moved in closer, then went dead silent as he pointed out the various highlights of the car and thanked Phillips 66 for making this Grand Door Prize possible. Finally, with the help of volunteer Rebecca Kendall, the winning ticket was drawn. Teasing the breathless group, Rick read each digit on the ticket one at a time. In response, the crowd cheered or booed with each recitation as, one numeral at a time, their chances of winning became more defined. In the end, the winner was Delvin Albers of Minco, OK (see next story).

In addition to the Mustang, many other valuable door prizes were given away, thanks to the contributions of a number of Oklahoma merchants such as \$250 of Phillips 66 gasoline, several copies of limited edition Route 66 postmark art, Frankoma pottery, autographed copies of several different Route 66 books, overnight stays at several area motels and bed & breakfasts, and so forth.

"Our Association - especially our Executive Director John Ackenhausen and Eastern and Western Vice Presidents Rick Schmigle and Carol Duncan - have put in a lot of long hours to make this event happen," said Kathy Anderson, President. "Everything from selecting the checkpoints and creating the passports to traveling up and down the Route time and time again to get everything ready to go. As a result, we've received a lot of positive feedback about our Celebration.

"More importantly, many of the participants told me they intend to go back out on the Route and spend more time exploring the Road and her businesses and communities," continued Kathy. "If they do that, then we have accomplished what we set out to do – introduce Oklahoma Route 66 to a whole new group of people. And without the wonderful sponsorship of Phillips Petroleum who made it possible for us to buy and restore the Mustang, I know we would not have had such a great turnout. Sometimes it takes that extra incentive like a classic car for folks to get out and explore what most Oklahomans take for granted but have never visited – Route 66. I'd also like to thank all the radio and TV stations and newspapers who often went above and beyond to help us promote our event. Now that more people understand the treasure we have on Route 66 in Oklahoma, hopefully our efforts to preserve, promote and economically bolster Oklahoma Route 66 will find more widespread support in the future."

Dad retired on June 12, 2001 from truck driving – just in time for the big cruise and car show.

Dad has had a love of classic cars since the 1950s. Even though he loves Chevrolets he does like some Fords but refuses to own one unless it is given to him or he wins it. I guess you can say once a Chevy man always a Chevy man. He also has a 1947 International Panel and a 1984 Corvette that he takes to the many car shows around the area. Also in his collection of classics he has a 1947 Hudson pickup, a 1953 Studebaker pickup, a 1957 Chevy 2-door 210 station wagon, and a 1947 Chevy 2-door Fleetline along with several more. As he says these are works in progress.

On the morning of July 13, 2001 when Dad started off on the Route 66 75th Anniversary Cruise, he planned to take his time to enjoy all that the Route had to offer. It took him about 14 or 15 hours to complete the cruise. He wanted to be sure he stopped at all the checkpoints - all 33 of them. Little did he know that by the evening of July 15 he would have his ticket number drawn and he would become the winner of the 1966 Ford Mustang that was being given away.

As his number was called, Dad was in shock. He never dreamed he might win the Mustang. He said he had not even looked at the car at the show or other places it had been. That tells you how true a Chevy man he is when he didn't even look at the Mustang until he won it.

Dad says he is happy to have won the car and thinks he can make it fit into his ever growing collection of classic cars as it is very nice and was the give-away car from the 75th Anniversary of Route 66. He said he will also enjoy taking it to shows around the state. So be sure to look for the Chevy man driving a Ford Mustang.

Finally, Dad would like to say "thank you" to Phillips 66 for making the give-away possible. He would also like to thank all of the people linked to the cruise and the Route 66 Association for making this a day to remember because - a Chevy man won a Ford.

Every two years, the Oklahoma Route 66

This year's ceremony is timed to coincide with the actual 75th Anniversary of the birth of Route 66 and the entire US Highway system, which came into being on November 11, 1926.

OK 66 Association member garners two awards


Congratulations to Jim Ross! El Reno launches trolley

It's been years in the making, but on Friday August 24th, El Reno took an historic step back in time. During well-attended dedication

ceremonies, the town's beautifully restored red trolley was launched, recalling the days of when a vast interurban system connected El Reno, Oklahoma City, Norman and Edmond. With cheering onlookers wearing everything from halter tops and shorts to parasols and period dresses, the trolley set course from downtown, escorted by the high school marching band. Attendees for the evening event were able to ride the trolley for free.

City leaders hope the trolley will help attract tourists to the community and do plan to extend the system over time. The trolley costs \$3.00 for adults, a \$1.50 per child and runs 5 days a week. Maze of Maize Now Open on OK Route 66

P-Bar Farms, one of the Association's newest business members, is not your ordinary corn-in-the-field farm. They've set aside 6.5 acres as a Route 66-shaped maze. It is open to the public just for the months of September and October, with this year marking their debut. The maze may well be the only one like it on all of Route 66.

Located between Hydro and Weatherford on the old Route, 9'-tall stalks line about 2.5 miles of trails and over 80 decision points. The maze is open Thursdays through Saturdays. Hours on Thursday and Friday are 4 pm to 10 pm, Saturday from 10 am to 10 pm. Admission is \$6.00 for adults, \$4 for children between 5 and 12, and kids under 5 get in free. If you travel via I-40, the maze lies between Exits 84 and 88. Signs on Route 66 will lead the way to the big red barn.

Blue Whale's Zelta Davis passes away By Thomas Repp

The Blue Whale of Catoosa may look a little bluer of late. Zelta Davis, owner of that famous Route 66 icon, passed away on August 1.

Many of us will remember Zelta as Catoosa's Red-haired Whirlwind. The lady had spirit. Zelta was a bona fide beauty in her younger years. At a time when many women languished in their kitchens, Zelta believed any woman could stand up to any man. Once, when a stranger thought to comment on her figure, Zelta beat an apology out of him with a bag of Christmas candy. Not bad for a farm girl born in Sallisaw some 81 years ago.

Adulthood for Zelta meant stepping onto the stage. She was married twice, first to Ray Sheehan and then to life-partner Hugh Sterling Davis. The Davises' adventures at Tulsa's Mohawk Zoo have become the stuff of legend. The couple toured the lecture circuit, raised grizzly bears on bottles and met each day with crackling good humor. Once, Hugh brought home two baby chimpanzees. Zelta kept them in diapers and suited them with their own bassinet. When a new laundry man came to the door for a routine pickup, Zelta asked him, "Would you like to see my twins?" The poor laundry man took one look and went back to Claremore. He told his higher-ups, "I just saw the ugliest babies I think I've ever seen."

Hugh built the Blue Whale in the early 1970s. He presented it to Zelta as an anniversary gift - a symbol of their wild life and times. In later years, Zelta was pleased so many Route 66 fans liked her whale, too.

Zelta suffered a stroke in September of 2000. From that time forward, she lived with her daughter, Dee Dee. She read voraciously (par was a book per day) and sent Dee Dee to the library once a week to pick up books. Zelta vowed she would never check into a hospital. The nurses, she complained, would never let her smoke. Zelta's assessment of aging, repeated for the masses at her funeral was, "This 'getting old business' is a bunch of crap."

Trip Guide deadlines moved up






