Write carefully to promote 66

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of articles about how to work with the press to focus positive attention on Route 66.

- Use specific language. A consultant once asked Enron executives what the company sold. Their answer? "We sell the future." You can't sell the future. So what were they selling? Say what you mean. Don't hide behind vague terms that don't mean anything.

- Proofread, proofread, proofread. Spellcheck your press release. Have someone with a gift for grammar look at it to make sure it reads well and doesn't contain any grammatical errors. Make sure names are spelled correctly and phone numbers are correct.

- Be honest. If you've booked 25 vendors for your flea market, don't say you've lined up 50. If you're driving Route 66 in a 1998 Dodge Neon, don't say you're driving it in a 1968 Corvette.

- Be prepared. If your contact person isn't ready to answer questions about an event or project, don't send out a press release.

- Timing is everything. Generally speaking, the best time to send out a press release is two weeks before your event — far enough in advance to give the media time to prepare a story, but late enough the press release won't get tossed aside and forgotten until it's too late.

- Know your audience. Don't send a press release about a rock concert to a gospel radio station. Don't send a press release about a car cruise to a weekly shopper. If you're not sure about a publication or radio station's format, call and ask. Also, never send a press release to a media outlet whose offices are more than 20 miles from your event.

Lillie's offers eclectic gift ideas

If you can't find it at Lillie's, you probably don't need it.

Lillie's Candles and Gifts opened June 6 in the old OK Cleaners building on Route 66 in Tulsa.

The business started as a hobby: Owner Theresa "Lillie" Williams learned to make candles this spring.

A few weeks later, she and a friend were hired to clean out the former OK Cleaners.

The building's owners offered to rent it to them at a price they couldn't turn down.

With her newfound candlemaking skills, Williams decided to open a gift shop.

She outfitted the front of the building with a sign that features a Route 66 shield and the word "Lillie's" in vibrant red neon.

Opening just a week before the International Tulsa Route 66 Festival, Williams started out with an inventory that was limited to candles and a few other items.

She added products gradually: incense, soap, candleholders, decorative items, jewelry, a few post-cards.

Some of the candles come in cute shapes — Coca-Cola glasses contain candles fashioned to look like ice-cream sodas with cherries on top, a glass dish holds a candle masquerading as a hot fudge

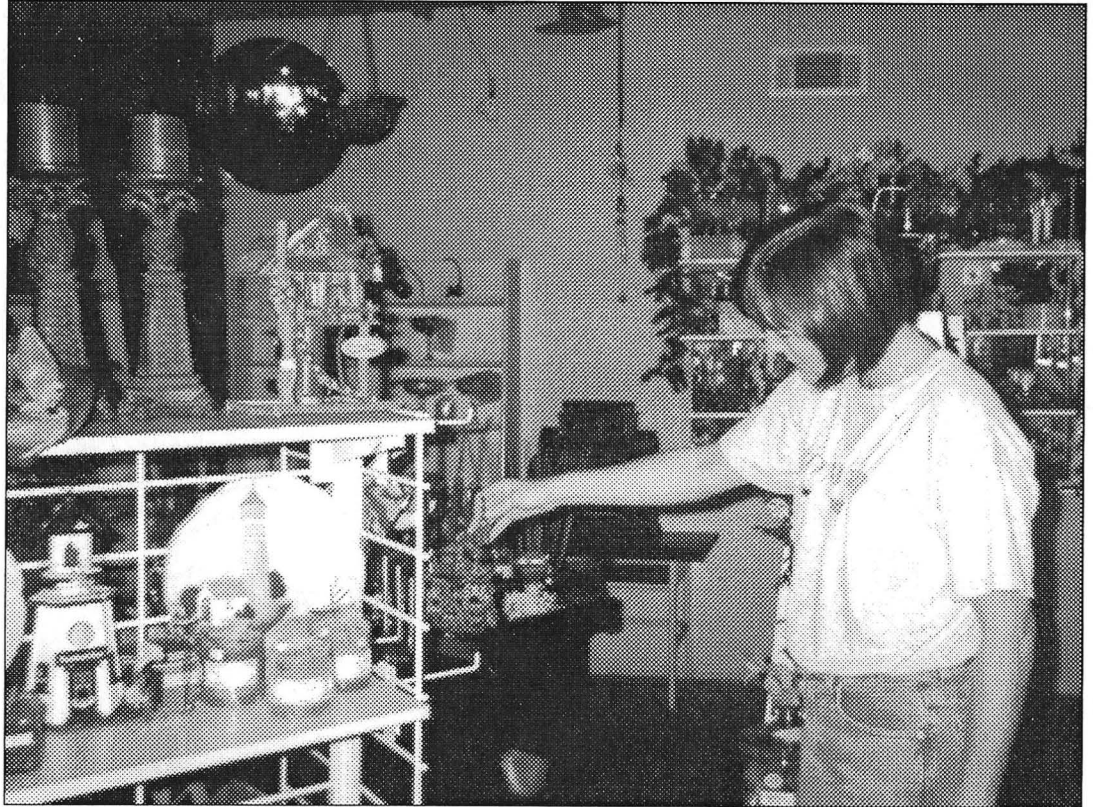

brownie delight — but Williams said the most popular candles are the plain ones.

"When they buy a fancy thing, they don't burn it," she said.

Potives (a type of candle shaped like a flowerpot) come in every imaginable scent from sandalwood to sugar cookies.

For road warriors, Williams has candles made from hubcaps filled with wax. Eventually, she plans to add more road-themed merchandise, including Route 66 candles.

Williams also offers soaps in many scents, colors and shapes, and cus-

tomers can order Mary Kay products from her.

In addition to merchandise, Lillie's offers computer sales and repairs and an eBay sales service.

Customers can bring in items they want to sell on eBay, and Williams and a friend will inventory, research, photograph, describe and list the items on eBay.

The customers' property is safe at Lillie's — it is stored in a safe dating from the 1930s that sports a sign on the front that says, "Warning: This property is protected by chemical warfare gas."

The safe still has some

type of gas bomb inside it.

"Anybody wanting to sell eBay items here, they don't have to worry about them being stolen, because they're protected by chemical warfare," Williams laughed.

Lillie's will be open from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. seven days a week through the holidays. Regular hours are 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

Lillie's is located at 2609 W. 40th Place in Tulsa, just north of Ollie's Station Restaurant on Southwest Boulevard.

Route 66 loses a longtime friend

Steinbeck Award winner Teague dies

Tom Teague, 61, founder of the Route 66 Association of Illinois and author of the book *Searching for 66*, died Sept. 11, 2004.

Teague, a resident of Springfield, Ill., was known up and down Route 66 for his research and support of the old highway.

He started the Route 66 Association of Illinois with a group of 15 people in 1989 and was elected the organization's first president.

He also was the founder of the Soulsby Station Society, a preservation group dedicated to restoring the historic station in Mount Olive, Ill. Teague worked to get the

station listed on the National Register of Historic Places and led a crew of volunteers who refurbished the exterior of the station in 2003.

Teague was honored in 1998 with the National Historic Route 66 Federation's prestigious John Steinbeck Award, given annually to someone who has made significant contributions to Route 66.

He also led bus tours on Route 66 in Illinois and traveled to other states to share the history of the Mother Road through a digital slide presentation and lecture.

Teague is survived by his wife, Beth, of Springfield.

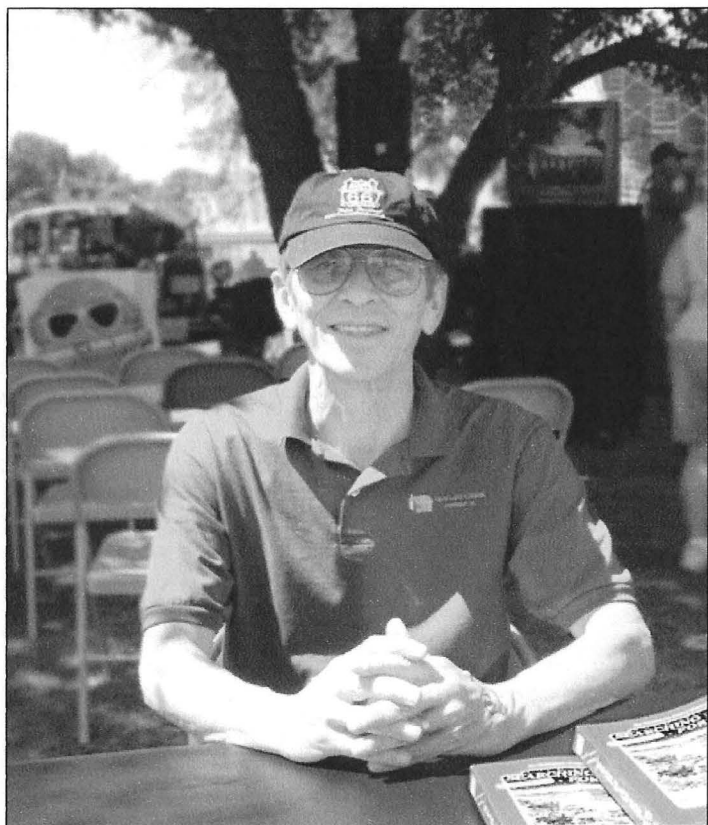

Western Oklahoma artifacts shipped to museum in Illinois

The Joliet Area Historical Museum in Illinois has set up an interactive exhibit for children about Route 66.

Many Route 66 attractions and associations were contacted with requests for contributions to educate, to inspire and to excite young children about the Mother Road.

Materials from western Oklahoma were mailed to educator Kim Martin at the museum.

Some of the items included in the exhibit are:

- A plastic model of a mythical Route 66 town.
- A vacation suitcase filled with all the usual items.
- Displays of historical information.
- A living exhibit of a roadside diner.
- A special table exhibit for the story of the Joad family.

Martin said the kids were very interested and intrigued by the state of Oklahoma.

April 29 is deadline for grant applications

Applications for the Route 66 Corridor Preservation Program 2005 cost-share grant cycle will be accepted from Jan. 31 to April 29, 2005.

Application packages may be requested from the program office during that time or may be printed from the program Web site at <http://www.cr.nps.gov/rt66>.

Potential applicants are encouraged to contact the program office with any questions

about the application process.

The Route 66 Corridor Preservation Program, in cooperation with the National Register of Historic Places office in Washington, D.C., is developing a Web-based travel itinerary for Route 66.

The itinerary will highlight over 60 historic Route 66 properties that are listed on the National Register of

Historic Places.

The Web site will enable heritage-minded visitors to plan their Route 66 travel around National Register sites.

The Web site will feature an overall history and map of the national route, with individual histories, descriptions, photos and other information for each of the 50 sites. It has been estimated that the itinerary will receive about 1,000 online visitors per week.

It is expected that the site will be launched in late 2005 or early 2006.

In the meantime, you can see other heritage travel itineraries by visiting the National Register of Historic Places Web site at <http://www.cr.nps.gov/nr/travel/index.htm>.

Over the last decade, the eight states through which Route 66 passes have been working to conduct inventory surveys of historic Route 66 properties in their respective states. To date, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico have completed surveys. Arizona has completed a partial survey, and California is initiating a comprehensive survey.

To synthesize and manage this data, a GIS database is being developed that will be accessible online. The information will consist of route map data, property

locations with inventory and condition information, photographs, National Register nomination forms, etc.

The database system will allow users to retrieve information for multiple uses and will enable managers to more easily identify priority sites and preservation needs.

When completed in 2006, the site will be accessible through the National Park Service Route 66 Preservation Program Web site.

A national historic context has been prepared for Route 66, which establishes a broad historic context for the route as it relates to the larger federal highway system. The research includes an assessment of the economic, social and political forces that shaped the history of Route 66.

The written narrative context will serve as the basis for the subsequent preparation of approximately 50 nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, which will take place over the next two years.

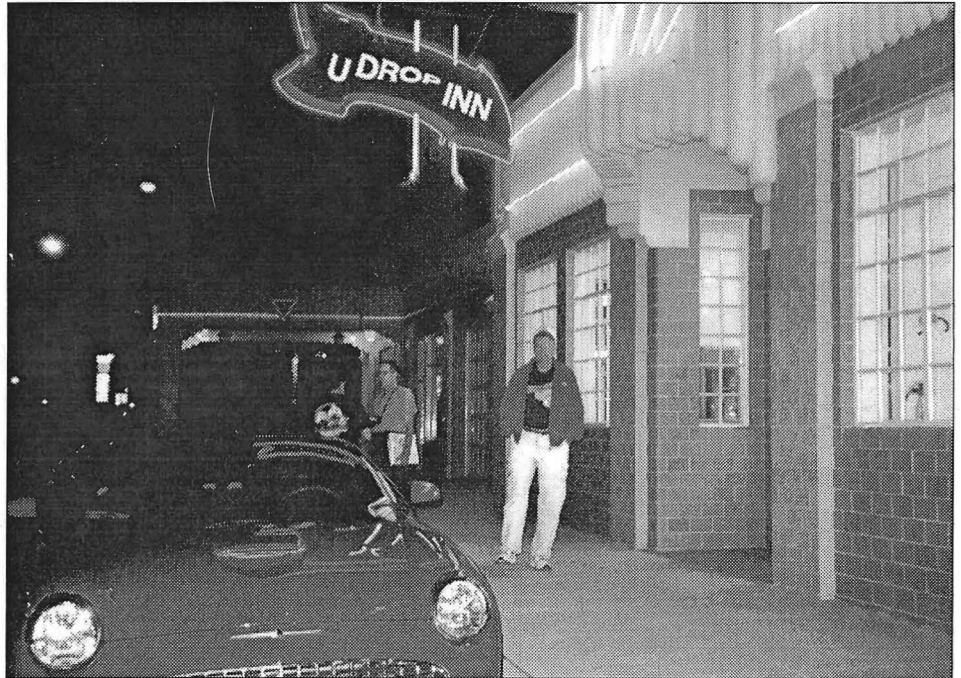
A special thank you goes out to Brenda for getting the caravan off to a good start.

Not everybody was in the picture because of holdups, but we had a good representation. The clock was ticking, so off we went to the bustling town of Weatherford.

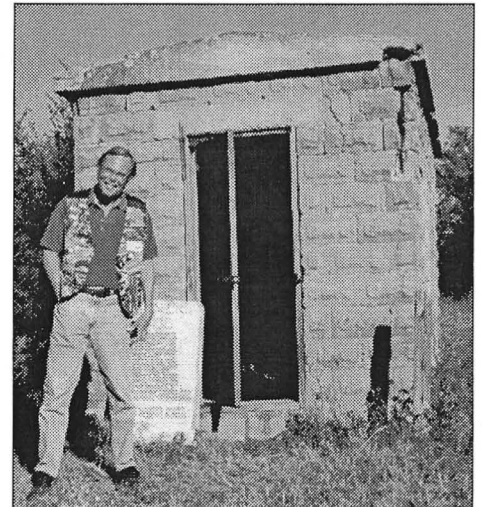
Basically, the caravan stopped to collect together on the east side of each town on Route 66, and then everybody grouped together again on the west side of town on Route 66.

Annual meeting, board schedule set for next year

Meetings are slated for 2 p.m. April 24 at the Sandhills Curiosity Shop in Erick; 2 p.m. July 24 in the Tulsa area (the meeting is tentatively planned for Emily Priddy's home in west Tulsa, but larger, more comfortable facilities are being sought) and 2 p.m. Oct. 23 at the visitors' center off I-35 in Oklahoma City.

The board held its regular meeting Oct. 31 in Oklahoma City.

Board members present were Kim Evans, treasurer; Jerald Ashby, Canadian County representative; Ron Burden, Lincoln County representative; Carol Duncan, Washita County representative, and Marion Davidson, Custer County representative. Others present were Sue Preston; Sonny Preston; Bill Fernau; Linda Fernau; Marilyn Emde; John Ackenhausen; Donna Ackenhausen; Marilyn Ashby; Billie Scott; Paula

Scott and Emily Priddy.

In the absence of a president or vice-president, Kim Evans was appointed acting chairman. Emily Priddy was appointed interim secretary.

During the meeting, board members and visitors discussed concerns about possible violations of the Oklahoma Open Meeting Act. Because the Association receives state grant monies, it is subject

to the provisions of the Open Meeting Act.

Emily Priddy gave a presentation on the Open Meeting Act, and after extensive discussion, the board appointed a three-member advisory committee consisting of John Ackenhausen, Bill Fernau and Emily Priddy to investigate possible violations of the Act, ways to correct those violations and ways to prevent similar issues from arising in the future. The board appointed Bill chairman of the committee, which will report on its findings at the annual meeting in January.

Treasurer Kim Evans distributed a profit and loss report showing the Association's recent receipts and expenditures. She reported that bus tours conducted in June in conjunction with the International Tulsa Route 66 Festival brought in less money than the Association spent to put them on. She said the Scissortail Group in Tulsa is supposed to be holding some money it collected from the bus tours, but she didn't know how much. Linda Fernau said minutes from a previous meeting show a total of 60 people participated in the bus tours at \$66 each, but the Association has not received most of the money for those ticket sales.

The board also discussed the lack of participation in meetings by some board members and the general difficulty of getting members together for meetings when they are spread out across the state. Possible solutions to the problem were suggested, including amending the bylaws to make it mandatory for board members to attend meetings,

Linda Fernau reported that the association got forms filled out for a grant, but they had to be signed and noted in the minutes, so an emergency meeting was held to do that. She reported that the Association received two checks for grants: \$4,250.30 for an advertisement in a Dallas newspaper and \$19,250 from OLCA.

Marilyn Emde read a report from Rick Schmigle stating that Route 66 has been designated as a state scenic byway, but the Association needs help getting it designated as a National Scenic Byway. Linda Fernau said there is a meeting in three weeks that is the second step to becoming a National Scenic Byway. In his report, Rick also announced that he does not intend to seek another term as vice-president.

Emily Priddy thanked board members for turning in items for the previous newsletter and reminded everyone that the deadline for submissions for the upcoming newsletter is Nov. 15. She said members need to make sure they tell her about news and events in their area so she can put it in the newsletter.

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What do we mean by 'open' meetings?

The Open Meeting Act is a state law that gives taxpayers the right to find out how their money is being spent.

Any organization that gets money from the state or federal government is subject to the Open Meeting Act. The law includes many provisions. Here are a few of the most important ones:

- Meetings must be held in a location that is accessible to the public.
- Meetings must be announced in advance. Regular meetings for next calendar year must be scheduled before the end of this year, and the agenda for each meeting must be posted on the office door and on the Web site 24 hours in advance.
- Special meetings must be announced 48 hours in advance.
- All votes must be taken in public meetings.

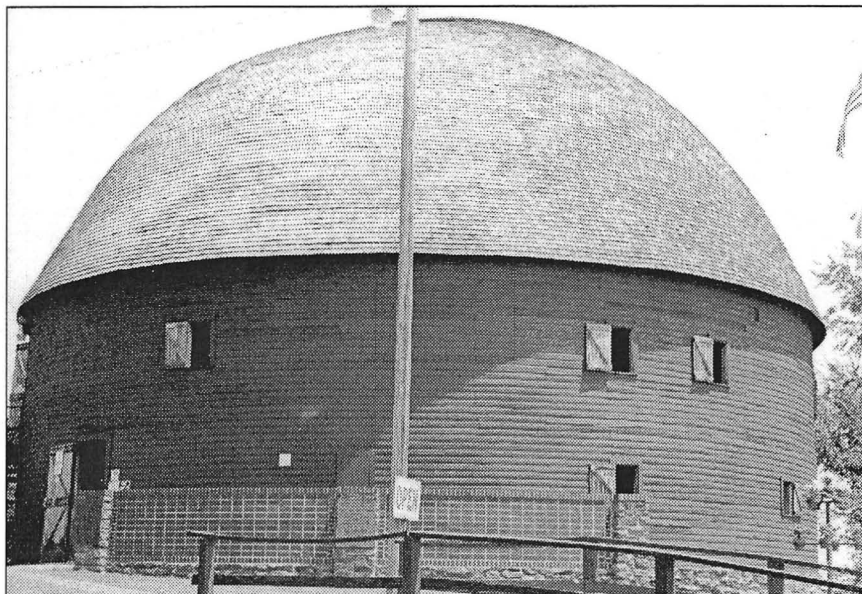
