
If you wish to make a donation, there is a place for that on the form as well.







Faith and Photography: Western Oklahoma Man Shares His Gifts (a testimony taken from samsphotography.com)

ERICK, OKLAHOMA - Samuel Hagen takes most of his photographs "at home." And home to Sam is western Oklahoma. Born in California, Sam moved to Oologah when he was six. He came to Erick a few years later when his parents divorced. The youngest of six children, Sam followed his mother as she traveled the state doing cleanup on new apartments. He calls it a "hardscrabble life."

At 23, Sam was diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. He accepted the invitation from elders at Mount Zion Church in Erick to anoint his head with oil and pray for him. He still remembers the healing fire as the elders lay hands on him. He emerged a changed man.

Following cancer treatment in Tulsa, Sam returned to Erick where he worked odd jobs until one day in 1998. A friend handed him a camera and gave him the feature editor job at the Sayre Journal. When the newspaper closed a year later, he bought his own camera and never looked back.

Samuel Hagen's photos depict a fading lifestyle on the prairie {much like that of Route 66.} From vacant homesteads to the vanishing family farmer, his work captures a moment in time.

Sam has been featured on Integris Health's Discover Oklahoma, a weekly televised travel program, and non KFOR-TV's *Is This A Great State or What*? and several local and state newspapers. "First Light," featured on the cover of his most recent book, The Master's Light ... a Testimony, hangs in the State Art Collection at the Oklahoma State Capitol.

"Photography can mend shattered dreams or build a puzzle where there is a missing piece," Sam says. "Preserving these memories for future generations is what drives me every day of my life."

The Porter House Diner: Weatherford's new arrival

WEATHERFORD, OKLAHOMA – The Heartland of America Heritage Museum in Weatherford, Oklahoma is near completion of a major restoration project. The newest exhibit to the Museum, the Porter House Diner, should be open for viewing in late February or early March, 2009. The Porter House Diner will be located on the west side of the Little Red One-Room School House and the Barthel Blacksmith Shop & Buggy Repair, clearly visible from both Route 66 and Interstate 40.

The original dining establishment was built in Kansas by Arthur Valentine, entrepreneur of the restaurant chain known as the Valentine Diner. Later purchased and moved to Weatherford by ML Porter, the new Porter House Diner was operated by the Porter and the Snow families. It was a hot-spot on the Mother Road, a popular stop for travelers and locals alike during the 1950's, '60's and '70's. A guest book provided by Porter's sister Mrs. Snow, still a resident of Weatherford, reveals that Elvis Presley frequented the Porter House Diner on his Route 66 travels through Oklahoma heading to the West Coast. One entry in the guest book is dated April 22, 1960, with his name, home as Memphis, and remarks as "Cool, Daddy." The guest book will be part of the Hartland Museum display.

On your next Route 66 road trip through western Oklahoma, be sure step back in time to the Heartland of America Heritage Museum at 1600 S Frontage Rd in Weatherford.

And so it begins: El Reno revitalization of Route 66

EL RENO, OKLAHOMA - As jackhammers tear out old sidewalks downtown and workers continue efforts on capital improvement projects, efforts are under way to bring one of El Reno's "greatest treasures" back into the spotlight.

Long before Interstate 40 was built, giving cars a highspeed way to cross the country, a "little road" – Route 66 snaked through the hills and valleys from Chicago to California, right through the heart of Oklahoma and right through the middle of El Reno.

In those days, Route 66 was more than a tourist curiosity. It was the way to cross the country. It also provided families with a way to be together as they traveled the open road. The history of the route provides now only a glimpse into the past but also an investment in the city's future, El Reno photographer Larry Nance said.

"Having the route go through El Reno is a huge opportunity for economic development for our city," he said.

City Council members agreed, approving an agreement Jan. 6 which will begin the process of revitalizing the city's Route 66 corridor. That memorandum of understanding – entered into with the University of Oklahoma College of Architecture – will use grant monies awarded to the city by the federal Department of Transportation to create a planning corridor along state Highway 66 from South Manning Road to Fort Reno, Community Development Director Robert Coleman said.

The effort began in 2007, when city officials applied for a \$40,000 National Scenic Byways Grant from USDOT. Although the grant was approved in December 2007, efforts to move forward were stalled until now, Coleman said.

Although efforts have been slow, they are picking up momentum, said Nance and Convention and Visitors Bureau Director Gene Stroman. Nance and Stroman have been working with City Manager Tony Rivera to come up with a plan to put Route 66 back on the map, Nance said.

Nance said he has been captivated by Route 66 for years. The road is more than just concrete and asphalt to him – it's a thoroughfare to the past, to a happy time of his childhood.

"Route 66 was more than just a road, it was a lifestyle that meant something," he said. "It was a place where a little



boy could go into a trading post and come out with his first rubber tomahawk."

In 2007, Nance decided to trace long-ago trips over the route as he rode from Oklahoma to the end of the road in Santa Monica, Calif. He said it was the "trip of a lifetime" that he will never forget.

"There is a place near the Pecos River in New Mexico – you can see the train tracks, and the cars traveling I-40 in the distance," he said. "It's like in the movie 'Cars' where you realize that people are missing so much on that interstate. I don't want people to just travel by us on I-40. I want them to see what we have."

Route 66 was in large part the brainchild of entrepreneurs Cyrus Avery of Tulsa and John Woodruff of Springfield, Mo. In 1925, Congress passed national highway construction legislation, and in 1926, Route 66 – which would eventually link Chicago to Los Angeles – was born.

During the 1950s, the country would eventually change over to the interstate highway system, and in 1985 the highway was decommissioned. That wasn't the end of the "Mother Road," though.

"People just won't let it die – there is such a passion surrounding it," Nance said. "They tried to build five interstate systems to replace it, and it couldn't be done."

That passion, Nance said, is what he is counting on to bring the route to its full potential in Canadian County.

"Once you find a passion for Route 66, it never lets you go," he said.

Economic Study Presented as Important Tool for Heritage Preservation

OKLAHOMA CITY - Preservation Oklahoma, Inc. and its many partners announced the release of *Economic Impacts of Historic Preservation*, one of the most important tools ever provided for Oklahoma's historic preservation efforts, during a special presentation on January 9th at the Oklahoma History Center. "We believe that the study offers community leaders in the public and private sectors the data they have long needed to support improvements in public policy that will not only stimulate our economy, but will result in improved preservation of the buildings, structures, sites, districts, objects, and landscapes that represent Oklahoma's unique heritage," said Dr Bob L Blackburn, State Historic Preservation Officer.

Dr David Listokin, Center for Urban Policy Research, Rutgers University, and Dr Dan S Rickman, Oklahoma State University, delivered the special presentation, detailing the methodology for completing the study and the exciting final results of the effort. The study examined the direct and indirect impacts of historic preservation activities in Oklahoma



for the year 2007 and concluded that they totaled \$357 million for the period (rehabilitation/\$125 million; heritage tourism/\$175 million; and Main Street/\$57 million). The state's preservation

leaders have long believed

that preservation and adaptive reuse of historic properties makes sound business sense for communities of all sizes, and now they have sound evidence of just how significant historic preservation is to a community's economy and its quality of life. The study also addresses the impacts of two key Oklahoma Preservation programs since their beginnings, the federal rehabilitation tax credits program and the Oklahoma Main Street Program.

With financial contributions from the State Historic Preservation Office, the City of Oklahoma City, Chesapeake Energy, the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the Kirkpatrick Family Fund, and

Julie Bott Miner in memory of Lt Col and Mrs James F Bott, Preservation Oklahoma, Inc selected the Center for Urban Policy Research, Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey to complete the study. Dr Listokin and Dr Michael Lahr of Rutgers directed the project, and Dr Dan S Rickman, Oklahoma State University worked closely with them to complete the property valuation analysis portion of the study. Rutgers developed, under contract to the National Park Service's National Center for Preservation Technology and Training, the input/output model used for this and many similar studies across the nation. It is known as the Preservation Economic Impact Model (PEIM).

The Oklahoma Main Street Center, Oklahoma Department of Commerce was also a key partner in the initiative as they provided valuable and extensive data for the study and participated in draft study reviews and other activities. The Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department also generously provided assistance.

The study included a detailed analysis of the economic impacts of general rehabilitation work in Oklahoma, of redevelopment completed under the federal and state rehabilitation tax credits programs; of the Oklahoma Main Street Program; of heritage tourism initiatives; and of local historic district designation.

An executive summary of the study provides a concise statement about how historic preservation activities are contributing to Oklahoma's statewide and local economies and places these efforts in a national context. A memo From Míke ...



Mike Hickey: Oklahoma Route 66 Association President

Last month I had a meeting in Weatherford at noon so I went over early with Harry and Jack to visit the Tom Stafford Museum before the luncheon. I had to leave them there because there was so much to see and they could "eat anytime".

I grew up with the space program. John Glen circled the earth on my twelfth birthday. I was hooked on flight. I learned to fly at twenty-three. I have parachuted from a helicopter. Still Keeping Time with a Kit-Cat Klock



Expressway (Route 66) in Bethany.





JM Davis Arms and Historical Museum

The **JM Davis Arms and Historical Museum** is the world's largest privately owned gun museum that houses over 20.000 unique firearms along with a Believe It or not Oddities Gallery, which includes:

A gallery of outlaw guns
Native American artifacts
John Rogers statuaries
Western memorabilia
Antique music boxes and musical instruments
12,000 steins from all over the world
Early American antiques
An extensive firearm research library
Gift shop
Smallest commercially produced handgun in the world

When John Monroe Davis was seven years old, his father gave him a muzzle-loader. This began a fascination with guns that never stopped. That first gun is still in the collection.

In 1961, Davis traded 2000 acres of Arkansas timberland for a hotel in Claremore, OK. He moved in and assumed management of the Mason Hotel. He continued to add to his collection one gun at a time, and by 1929 Davis' had 99 guns. He decided to display the guns in the lobby of his hotel, along with his knives, swords, steins, saddles, political buttons, WWI posters, and a host of other treasures. He eventually HAD to expand.

The Mason Hotel was on Route 66, and word of his collections spread quickly. Steady streams of people came from worldwide to fraternize and deal with Davis, who became world renowned as a firearms expert.

In 1965, Davis transferred ownership of his collection to the JM Davis Foundation Inc, who in turn leased it to the State of Oklahoma at the cost of \$1.00 for 99 years, along with an agreement to build and maintain a modern facility for Davis' collection and to allow free admission to the public.

The first section of the museum opened on Davis' 82nd birthday: June 27, 1969. The completed facility housed over 40.000 sq ft of floor space. Gun displays alone total over one mile in length.

JM Davis died in 1973, and as he is entombed on the museum grounds, he is still with his guns.



Minutes from the Oklahoma Route 66 Association annual meeting

The Oklahoma Route 66 Association held its annual meeting at 1pm, January 11, 2009 at the Chandler Public Library Conference Room: 1021 Manvel Avenue, Chandler. President Mike Hickey called the meeting to order. Jerald Ashby made the motion to approve the minutes from the October meeting, Ron Burden seconded, motion passed.

- President's Report: Mike Hickey reported that the National Scenic Byways Application was submitted on December 17. When this grant is awarded, there will be extensive Oklahoma Department of Transportation involvement with a statewide celebration, with political, infrastructural, business and chamber involvement. The status of Oklahoma Route 66 designation is subject to budget cuts, and will possibly achieve the designation status of All American Road. Web expansion may be an option. Mike further requested that the board check out other similar websites for ideas for our expansion. The Byways representatives are very confident that this will pass.

- Western Vice President's Report Mike Hickey presented the WVP report. Parts of the Oklahoma Route 66 highway and bridges in Blaine/Caddo County near Hydro have sustained considerable flood/erosion damage over the last two years, but the County Commission has worked to stabilize the erosion, and the road will not be closed.

- Treasurer's Report: Kim Evans presented the treasurer's report. The checkbook balance is \$8,241.39. The negative overall total is due to seasonal downtime. Linda Jordan wasn't available to do a pro bono audit. Jill Ann Church made motion to accept the report, BaLinda Miller seconded. Motion passed.

Mike Hickey stated that the Association will hopefully receive grants later in the year from the National Scenic Byways to provide funds for an audit. Jill Ann Church made a motion to forgo an audit this year, since both the expense report presented by Kim Evans and the expense report presented by Marilyn Emde match to the penny. Jerald seconded. Motion passed.

- Secretary's Report: Jill Ann Church requested feedback on the newsletter. Mike Hickey said that there have been no complaints.

- Administrator's Report: Marilyn Emde gave the administrator's report. The Association acquired 39 new members and 46 renewals since October's meeting. There was an end-of-year count of 116 new members in 2008, creating a 79 member increase over 2007. The Trip Guide grant request from Scenic Byways was denied. Feedback will be provided on ways to improve future requests. Green County donated a ½ page ad to the Oklahoma Route 66 Association in its 2009 Travel Guide. There are about 25 large and 25 extra large OK Route 66 t-shirts left, all white. They are mostly given away for new business member gifts. We broke even with the shirts.

* Old Business

- National Trust for Historical Preservation Conference Update Brad Nickson gave the NTHPC update. The Association sold more merchandise than anywhere else during the conference. Going outside normal Route 66 enthusiast parameters, we can interest new people more effectively. Many new faces volunteered to work the booth during the event, and the Association picked up a few new members and handed out more Trip Guides than at any event ever. The next NTHPC will be held in October 2009 in Nashville, TN.

- Holiday Lights Cruise Update

Jeanne Miller gave the Holiday Lights Cruise update. The Cruise was a successful one. The food and fellowship was great. The Sapulpa Parade was very nice. The Chandler Park Display was something that we can learn from, but the Interurban Café was very accommodating. There was interest in organizing a similar event for this year. Frank Gierhart suggested having an Association car in parades to display Oklahoma Route 66, and to also pass out flyers along the parade route. Marion Davidson and Jerry McClanahan expressed an interest in this suggestion.

- Membership Drive prize presentation: Mike Hickey presented Marion Davidson a certificate of appreciation for Marion's constant dedication and enthusiasm in his work for Oklahoma Route 66.

Jerald Ashby presented Jeannie Miller with third-place award: a numbered/matted photo by Shellee Graham of The OK Motel sign in Sapulpa.

Frank Gierhart presented Jill Ann Church with second-place award: a numbered/matted photo by Shellee Graham of the Blue Swallow Motel. Jill Ann also served Jerald Ashby with a pie in the face, as was specified in an earlier agreement as part of the winner's prize.

Jerald Ashby and Frank Gierhart presented Kim Evans with first-place

award: a pocket bike, donated by Jerald Ashby.

- Kid's Club by BaLinda Miller

The Kid's Club, organized last year, is growing with 5 members. The first event in the planning stages is the Chandler Night at the Museum, set at the Chandler Museum of Pioneer History, including a tour of the museum and a movie. Tentative times of March and May were suggested, and Kim Evans said she could volunteer her services in May. It was suggested to find out if discounts will be given by different businesses and organizations to Kid's Club members. The age bracket for this Club was determined to be 5-13 years of age. For more information contact BaLinda Miller.

- Introduction of Special Guests

* Miss Austyn Fulps is Miss Route 66 Outstanding Teen for 2009. She is a 16-year-old junior at Broken Arrow High School, and is very active in her church and she and her family sing at various churches and organizations in the Oklahoma area. Austyn's platform is Choose Respect. She is very anxious to help. Miss Jennifer Hancock is Miss Indian Nation 2009. She graduated from Westmore High School and is a senior at the University of Oklahoma, majoring in Zoology/Biomedical Sciences. Jennifer's platform is Everyone Counts.

- Trip Guide Report: Marilyn Emde reported three trip guide bids. The first from a local printer: \$21,433 plus extra for multiple dropoff points. The second was from a printer in Florida and was \$20,979 plus an extra \$3,500 for multiple drop-off points. The third from American Road Magazine, whom we used last year: \$14,200, which includes a 10% padding for fuel and paper price fluctuation. Prices offered for 40,000. Jeanne Miller motioned that we accept American Road's proposal. Kim Evans seconded. Marion Davidson asked for clarification of the prices listed on the expense report for Trip Guide costs. Marilyn Emde explained that part of the cost for the 2007 Trip Guides was paid in early 2008. Motion passed.

* New Business

Election of officers for two-year term: President- Mike Hickey, Eastern Vice President – Brad Nickson, Canadian County Representative -Jerald Ashby, At-Large County Rep-Jeanne Miller, Lincoln County Representative - Ron Burden, Tulsa County Representative - Brad Nickson **Confirmation of officers**: Western Vice President - Marie Hanza, Beckham County Representative -Doris Ray, Oklahoma County Representative - Alvin Harrell, At-large County Rep BaLinda Miller.

Frank Gierhart made a motion to accept the elect these individuals to their respective positions, Jill Ann Church seconded, as a group the election unanimously passed.

New Board of Directors shirts -Jeanne Miller: No other immediate decisions were made. Marilyn will contact the Board with her findings on what's available online.

Next Will Rogers Memorial – Carol Duncan: Carol Duncan suggested a fundraiser to fund the purchase of a Will Rogers monument, to bring attention to the historical significance of the nine-foot stretch of Route 66 near Miami. Mike Hickey said that was already being done, but the cold weather and precipitation have caused the need for snowplows along the stretch, tearing it up. It was stated also that Amanda Davis was working on that.

2009 Events and Cruises

- Sapulpa Blowout Fundraiser/Booth – Frank Gierhart stressed that this is the 20th anniversary of the Sapulpa Blowout. The event is expecting at least 300 cars, and it will be June 6 (it is always the first Saturday in June.) He strongly suggested that the Association have a booth at this event. Frank also suggested the possibility of having a car decorated to represent the Oklahoma Route 66 Association in various shows and parades throughout the state. Frank will have additional information at our next meeting.

- Joint Fundraiser with Chandler Route 66 Interpretive Center June 20 – Jeanne Miller and Kim Evans The event will have a car show, state-wide cruise, sock hop, vendors and a motorcycle show. The Association will be in charge of the state wide car cruise. There is a need for east and west business participation and volunteers to assist with registration, organization and prizes. Kim Evans made a motion to proceed with this. Jill Ann Church seconded. Motion unanimously passed.

A few weeks ago, I read that the state of Oklahoma was putting together a list of bridges slated for repairs or replacement in the next decade or so.

I'm for safe bridges as much as the next person. But I was concerned that the Pony Bridge, the amazing 38-truss span built in 1933 on old Route 66 near Bridgeport in Canadian County, would lose its distinctive look amid bureaucratic zeal to create a safe, yet humdrum, structure. I e-mailed the state department of transportation, explained its historical significance, and implored the agency to "repair, don't replace" the bridge.




Recently, I received a letter from Cole Hackett, public information officer for the agency. In part, it read:

The Canadian County project, scheduled for 2015, is in the early planning stages. I spoke with our environmental division engineer about the US 281 bridge and she said the bridge was placed in our 8year plan because it had major needs that need to be addressed. She assured me that they understand the historical significance of this bridge and have been in a dialogue with the State Historic Preservation Office to discuss what can be done to address those needs while at the same time maintaining the bridge's historical significance. As the plans to address those needs progress and an environmental study is done, we would appreciate input from you, the Oklahoma Route 66 Association and all those interested. Public input is vital to the planning process leading up to projects and we appreciate any input we receive. So the Oklahoma Department of Transportation is listening. If you want to also chime in that the Pony Bridge should be repaired but not replaced, the phone number is 405-521-3050.
